

Eighth Grade Salem Trip An Outstanding Experience

The group from Port Orford presented a program of Oregon History and symbols of government, including the state song and preamble to the Constitution of the United States; every member of the group having a part. Special guests at the banquet included Dr. Leon P. Minear, state superintendent of public instruction, speaker of the evening, Rep. and Mrs. Rod McKenzie of Sixes, Rep. and Mrs. James B. Bedingfield from Coos Bay, Mrs. Chapman, wife of Senator Richard Chapman who could not attend, Supt. Al Johnson from Port Orford-Langlois District 2CJ, Mr. and Mrs. Robert Eber-sole, chief capitol guide, and the daughter and son-in-law of Mrs. Hopkins who were her special guests.

Laws Of Offer And Acceptance
