SIXES GRANGE

The Sixes Grange met at the hall Saturday. Those present were to put off planting until after May 23 the vegetables and flowers that would freeze. Members were urged to keep poisons, such as Aldrin a poison for moles, away from small animals and pets since one member had lost a pedigreed Beagle puppy because of eating this poison.

It was announced that Coos County is putting in 30 acres of commercial beans this year and a tour of pastures in Josephine County was announced for May 15.

Clarence Brooks, legislative chairman, said in his report: "To have a healthy agriculture the farmer must live within a legislative realm that allows him elbow room through ownership of land, production and marketing, with the realization of a reasonable profit. Any legislation curtails these things it not only hurts the farmer but if allowed to stand will be felt by the entire nation. Excess profits made by handlers of agricultural products while the farmer can hardly meet his obligations and support his family can only be partly siphoned back into circulation with the income tax, while a sales tax works in the reverse. Excess profits made at the expense of someone else does not carry out our American theme of equal opportunity and neither does any tax that makes the poor poorer and the rich richer."

The grange has sold 1.17th of an acre on the east side of the hall to the state highway department for use in building the new highway. Brooks was elected as alternate delegate to the state convention in North Bend, June 12-16.

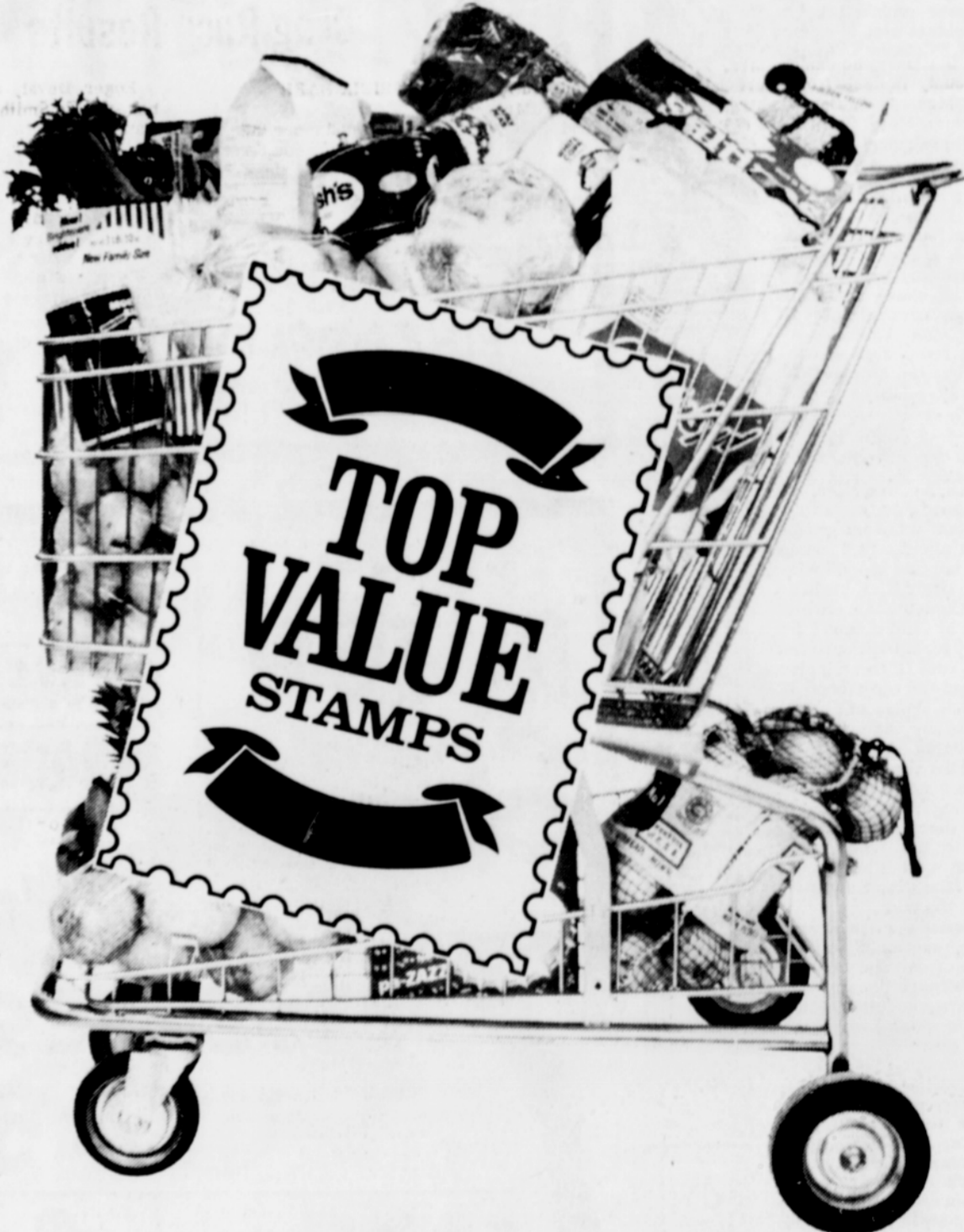
