

Meteorite Search Is On

This is Oregon's Year of the Meteorite.

Headed by Dr. Erwin F. Lange, Portland State College Professor of General Science; Hollis M. Dole, State Geologist, State of Oregon Department of Geology and Mineral Industries; and Phil F. Brogan, Bend, science writer and Pacific Northwest Director of the American Meteor Society, the committee hopes to bring to light undiscovered meteorites.

The public will be asked to cooperate in the year-long search. Meteorites may exist in wheat field mounds, in rock fences, on the open range, and even in private mineral collections.

In some states, the plow has uncovered more meteorites than any other instrument.

The committee sponsoring the Year of the Meteorite hopes to enlist the aid of many people in the state-wide search for these rocks from space, now of much interest as man prepares to land on the moon and probe the planets.

"It is hoped science teachers all over the state will discuss meteoritic properties with students, and will make the preliminary examination of suspected specimens thought to be different from ordinary rocks," Dr. Lange said.

If the science teacher is hopeful a new meteorite has been uncovered, the information can be forwarded with a small sample to any member of the committee.

Dr. Lange has a lead article in the current issue of THE ORE BIN, Department of Geology and Mineral Industries publication, dealing with meteorites including their identification.

Oregon has had four authentic meteorite discoveries. These included the 15.5 ton Willamette iron, largest yet found in the United States.

SWOCC To Offer Real Estate Course

This basic course is a practical study of Oregon Real Estate Law emphasizing the more complex aspects of ownership, use and transferability of real estate as encountered by brokers and others who deal with real property. Covers contracts, title, deeds, leases, liens, covenants, conditions, restrictions, easements, estates, probate, and landlord-tenant relationships.

Oregon Savings Bonds Sales Jump

"Savings Bonds sales in Curry County amounted to \$17,271 during January, compared to \$14,305 a year ago," the County Savings Bonds Committee Chairman announced here today.

"Total sales in Oregon last month showed a nice gain over sales a year ago, approximating 10 percent for the month, he continued. "Nationally, our sales were \$479 million for January, bringing the amount of Savings Bonds now held by the American people to \$51 billion, 472 million.

"During 1968 Bonds sales both in Oregon and nationally will be pushed through Share in Freedom Campaigns. The Oregon Campaign will be centered in the Portland area and will include Clackamas, Multnomah, and Washington Counties. It will begin May 1. "The drives will be aimed

toward every employed American who will be asked to buy bonds regularly through the monthly Payroll Savings Plan at his place of employment. Others will be asked to buy Bonds at their local banks.

"Leaders in industry, business, banking, labor, the media, and volunteer and other organizations are backing this National effort."

Dellenback Asks For Cut Backs

(Washington, D.C.) "The crises in our cities, the severe dislocation in our domestic economy and the near collapse of America's international relations are the direct result of Johnson Administration's failure to establish realistic and firm spending priorities," said Congressman John Dellenback.

"I propose the immediate imposition of new spending priorities which recognize the enormous social and economic difficulties which face this nation today and bring our national spending into line with necessary war time priorities.

I advocate reductions at once in the following areas:

In our military commitment in Europe

In Defense Department back-

ed arms sales abroad

In the Space Program

In Federal Employment

In Foreign Aid
In certain wasteful subsidy programs which are strangling our farmers

A portion of these savings can be reallocated into domestic programs which must be undertaken immediately, primarily:

Crime prevention and control

Job training and placement based on private enterprise

Housing Aids

Improvement of vocational and technical education

We need really effective steps to change priorities of spending at the federal level. Instead, the President proposes to the Congress such measures as the travel tax, a mere bandaid compared to the real surgery which needs to be performed on the spending policies of the Johnson Administration."

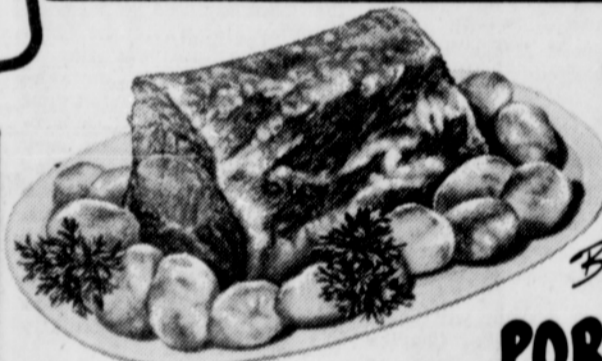
