Child Poisonings On The Increase

Nearly 1,000 Oregon children under the age of five years were poisoned accidentally last year, and three died.

Child poisonings in recent months are on the increase, according to state health reports. Two deaths have already occurred this year. A 2-year-old Ashland girl drank half-teaspoon of candle dye, and a two-month-old Albany boy ate several diet capsules.

Dr. Edward Press, state health officer, has issued this special appeal to parents for greater precautions against poisoning at home:

"Within a few days, Poison Prevention Week will be observed nationwide from March 17 to 23. It will be a time of concentrated effort through many avenues of communication to warn of the hazard facing small children in the form of everyday articles and med-

ications found in the average home.

"I urge every parent of a youngster just starting to walk to give particular attention to these warnings. Look carefully around your own house. Wherever you see any items that could be harmful if eaten, put them well out of a youngster's reach."

Dr. Press cited medicines, especially aspirin, as being most often involved in child poisoning accidents. Next most frequent are common household articles such as washing and cleaning agents, polishes, paints, insecticides and cosmetics.
