Southwest Oregon Picked For Teen Scene This Summer

Beavers, beware. . . and Ducks, start ducking! An alert bevy of Camp Fire Girls from cross-country will be heading for southwest Oregon this July. The special occasion will be part of a 12-day "Oregon Dunes and California Redwoods Travelcade" featured by Adventure '68, this year's National Horizon Club Conference for teenage members of the national youth organization.

The teen group and its adult advisors will arrive in Oregon on July 17, journeying up from northern California—first stop on their travels from the conference center in Estes Park, Colo. From then until July 23, they'll be hiking and swimming, camping and cooking out along our Coast Range. And all for a very serious purpose.

"Conservation in Action" is the theme of the conference, and the teenage participants will get a real chance to see and hear all sides of the conservation questions. In fact, it's the first time that business and industry, conservation groups and government agencies have cooperated jointly with youth organizations such as Camp Fire Girls—the better to spotlight different viewpoints on the important basic issues.

The touring teens will be studying first-hand the use and preservation of our country's beauty and bounty. Here in Oregon, they'll explore the steps being taken to protect our forests while maintaining a thriving lumber industry, to guard our wildlife and our lands, to foster our important fishing industry.

They'll view our mountains and our seashore. The Sea

Lion Caves can also expect some guests. And if an ambitious cub adopts the girls, they'll leave him there in the interests of "conservation!"

After visiting Klamath National Forest to learn about the U. S. Forest Service's Northwoods Purchase Unit, the teens will swing over to Gold Beach for camping at Harris Beach State Park and a boat ride up the Rogue River—an area of proposed Wild Rivers legislation. At Coos Bay, they'll watch logging and timber operations, visit a tree farm, and see myrtle wood being processed. Crab and shrimp packing will be investigated, too. . . and an Oregon salmon barbecue tasted right on the beach.

Cape Perpetua in Siuslaw National Forest will be another seaside camp site. The teens will hike, too, in the proposed Oregon Dunes National Park, will inspect a U. S. Coast Guard lighthouse, and enjoy the jounce

of a dunes buggy ride. The final touch-down point will be Oregon Marine Science Center in Newport.

The conference itself will end with a 4-day rally back in Estes Park. There the Camp Fire Girls, returning from different Travelcades, will pool their eye-witness findings, discuss the future conservation and plan back-home leadership projects under the topic "What's Next—What can WE lead, inspire, do!"

Slow-Moving Signs Mandatory By Law

If you operate slow-moving equipment on state highways, it must be equipped with a standard sign of a type approved by the Oregon Department of Motor Vehicles.

The agency says it has noted several examples of non-standard signs being used this spring. The new law, which took effect January 1 of this year, requires all vehicles or combination of vehicles (including implements of husbandry, tractors, road machinery and road rollers) designed for speeds of less than 25 miles per hour to display a standard slow-moving emblem. The law applies only on hard-surfaced highways under jurisdiction of the State Highway Commission.

The department has adopted an emblem which conforms to recommendations of the American Society of Agricultural Engineers. The sign is pyramid-shaped with a fluorescent orange center and a reflective red outline. It is 16 inches high and 14 inches wide and

must be visible day and night at least 500 feet away.

Copies of the regulation showing the design and mounting necessary to comply with the law may be obtained from the Department of Motor Vehicles, Salem, Oregon.

Direct Mail Is Faster Service

Oregon drivers who mail their punched card renewal reminder notices directly to Salem receive faster service than those who renew in person at a Department of Motor Vehicles field office.

The DMV says renewals sent by mail can be processed much faster because they are fed into a machine which is able to read and update individual records at the rate of about 1,000 per minute.

quire some manual processing because of the need to balance documents with money from the field offices. The department renews about 45,000 drivers licenses each month.

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
