Lions Tenth Anniversary Celebration Reviews Projects; Awards Made

The charter night dinner to celebrate the 10th anniversary of the Port Orford Lions club was held Sat. evening, Nov. 9, at the Masonic hall. The dinner was prepared and served by the ladies of the Eastern Star.

Joan Nelson and Betty Keeler had charge of decorations and Delbert Neal cared for the guest book, while Kay Neal pinned name tags on each one present.

Keith Nelson, president of the club, opened the meeting with the invocation by Rev. Donald Parsons and the flag salute. He then presented the master of ceremonies, William Miller, a past district governor of District 36E, who had assisted in chartering the Port Orford club.

A presentation of awards was made by Burrell Babb to 10-year members. Those receiving the awards were Conrad Johnson, Ray Reinke, Burrell Babb, Wilbur Green, Ira Tucker, Jim Wilson, Milton Leer and Ray Pearson.

Jim Gregory, Dict. Governor, introduced the speaker, Larry Sheehan, past district governor, who chartered the Port Orford club during his year in office. The club was chartered in 1957-58 with 51 members. Lion Roy Enlund was elected charter president, serving for the remaining portion of that year and all of 1958-59.

The first project after organizing was the sale of brooms, purchased through the Oregon State Blind commission, with Lion Jim Wilson as chairman. They also voted to participate in every possible way in the Oregon Centennial year celebration that was held on July 4, 1959.

In keeping with the Lions International programs they have actively supported sight conservation in the area and have purchased numerous pairs of glasses for needy students. They are now sharing this activity with the Langlois Lions club.

Other projects include the annual Christmas activities, the July 4th celebration, co-sponsor of the annual athletic banquet for the high school, donate annual scholarships to a delegate to 4-H summer school and to either Boys State or Girls State delegates. They built the drinking fountain at Battle Rock Park, support Little League and have worked with the Boy Scouts. One of their annual projects is to paint all the crosswalks in town. Currently they are sponsoring the bicycle safety program for elementary school students and for the past four years have sponsored a gun safety program. They are putting funds into a savings account to purchase land for a city park.

In 1964 the Port Orford club sponsored the Langlois Lions club. The Lions club has sent thanks to the Gold Beach club for their work in organizing and sponsoring them, and thanks also to all the past district officers for their assistance.
