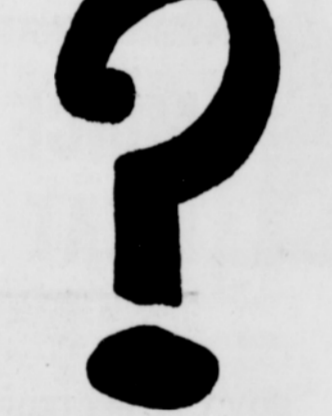

### Hearing Set In Portland On Oregon-Washington Milk Order

Proposals to establish a new Federal milk marketing order for parts of Oregon and Washington will be considered at a public hearing Dec. 3 in Portland, the United States Department of Agriculture has announced.

USDA's Consumer and Marketing Service officials said the hearing will begin at 9:30 a.m., in the Cosmopolitan Motor Hotel. It is being held at the request of the seven Oregon dairy farmer cooperative associations.

Dairy farmers propose that the milk marketing area to be covered by the order comprise 26 counties principally in the western half of Oregon, 10 Washington counties, and parts of two other Washington counties. Beyond these, handlers proposed to include four additional Oregon counties and three Washington counties. Principal cities in the proposed area are Portland, Eugene, Salem, Medford, Corvallis, Klamath Falls, Pendleton, Albany, Bend and Roseburg, Ore.; and Yakima, Vancouver and Walla Walla, Wash.

Similar to other Federal milk marketing orders, the Oregon-Washington order would set minimum prices which handlers of milk distributed in the proposed marketing area would be required to pay farmers who supply it. The orders do not set retail prices, however.

### Pheasant Season Closes Next Week

Upland bird hunters have one more weekend in which to pursue the colorful ring-necked pheasant, considered by most hunters to be the prize upland game bird in the state. At sunset on November 24 the statewide season on these birds will come to a close, marking an end to the 1968 hunt.

Also to close at that time is the season in western Oregon on quail, both valley and mountain. The season on quail in eastern Oregon, along with the season on Hungarian and chukar partridge, will continue through January 19.

Best prospects for the final weekend in western Oregon will continue to be areas on which hunting by permission is allowed, as these are the lands on which releases of game farm pheasants are made.

Dogs will be required to flush birds from heavy cover in eastern Oregon. Also, many ring-necked pheasants have taken to the sagebrush hills away from the adjacent agricultural lands.

Gunners are advised that chukar populations are good in most areas of eastern Oregon but now are scattered at all elevations. There is a bumper crop of valley quail, and shotgunners are missing an excellent bet by not concentrating on these birds.

### Seedlings Are Now Available

Order blanks for seedlings from the State Forest Nursery are now available at the County Extension Office in Coquille and the Coos Forest Protective Association Headquarters in Coos Bay, reports Lynn Cannon, Coos County Extension Agent. Trees from the state nursery are not for ornamental plantings but are for the purpose of establishing forest growth for reforestation, wind protection, post production, game cover, Christmas trees and erosion control.

Persons planning to order seedlings this year are urged to order early since supply may not equal demand for some species, according to Cannon.

Twelve conifers and five broadleaf species are available this year. They are: Douglas Fir, Ponderosa Pine, Scotch Pine, Shore Pine, Lodgepole Pine, Noble Fir, White Fir, Shasta Fir, Sierra Redwood, Chinese Arborvitae, and Norway Spruce. Broadleaf trees available from the nursery are Black Locust, Russian Olive, Chinese Elm, and Cargana.

Minimum orders are for fifty trees for \$2.50. Thereafter, trees are sold in multiples of fifty trees at \$14 to \$20 per thousand for conifers, and \$10 to \$13 per thousand for broadleaves. Prices include shipping costs. Douglas Fir, Ponderosa Pine, and White Fir in amounts of 10,000 or more are \$12 to \$15 per thousand with the purchaser paying the shipping cost.

### SOUTH COAST ANGLING

Despite the miserable weather along the south coast, last weekend, water conditions were right and anglers enjoyed good fishing on most streams.

The top spot was the Rogue River where good numbers of winter steelhead up to 18 pounds were being hooked on lures by both boat and bank anglers. Prospects for the weekend are excellent as water conditions continue to improve.

Fair to good catches of fall chinook are being taken from both the Elk and Siuslaw Rivers but many of the fish are turning dark as they approach spawning. Several whiter steel head have been taken the past week and angler success should improve as this fishery develops. Hunter Creek is still producing a few large chinook with the best fishing in the deeper upstream holes.

The Chetco River has not cleared as expected and remains very muddy with little chance to be ready by the weekend.
