Oregon 1970 was the theme of the annual Homemakers' Achievement Day at Sixes Grange last week. More than 60 women attended reports Jane Shearer, Curry extension agent.

## Traffic Deaths Show Increase

April traffic claimed 50 lives in Oregon, a figure nearly 22 per cent higher than that month a year ago, according to the Motor Vehicles Division.

The four month death toll was 202, compared with 190 for the same period in 1969.

Twenty-one were killed in weekend traffic crashes—an indication that with the return of spring more people are taking to the open highway for weekend outings.

The Division also pointed out that 16 of the April traffic victims were under 24, bringing the number of under-24 traffic victims so far this year in Oregon to 68. During the same period, 28 young Oregonians have been killed in Vietnam.

Analysis indicated that the leading types of fatal accidents last month were non-collision crashes, in which one vehicle ran off the road; striking a fixed object, and head-on crashes. All three, a spokesman said, generally mean the driver was "driving too fast for conditions of either the road, weather, traffic or vehicle, or his own driving ability."
