Grant Will Help Small Cities Housing Development

Receipt of a \$25,000, six-month planning grant from the Office of Economic Opportunity was announced today by Vern L. Weiss, Executive Director of the Oregon Housing Development Corporation. The grant will allow the organization to carry out a pilot program of technical assistance to Oregon communities who have not been able to develop housing for low and moderate income families on their own.

The OHDC is a non-profit membership corporation organized under the auspices of the Oregon Community Action Association, and funded since September, 1970, by a mobilization of Resources grant from OEO.

At least 135,000 Oregon families live in sub-standard housing, and about half of those families live in non-metropolitan areas, said Weiss. Further, only about 20% of the publicly assisted housing designed to help low income families is being produced in non-metropolitan areas. The OHDC was formed to help correct that imbalance, as well as to assist all low income families to find better housing.

Numbers Given For Park Reservations

The telephone numbers for the 11 parks participating in the State Park Campsite Reservation System and the Campsite Information Center were announced today by the State Highway Division.

None of the phone numbers announced today will be operable until Monday, May 17, when reservations will start to be accepted at any of the 11 parks. Reservations will be accepted through Sunday, September 5. There is no charge for making an advance reservation.

There are 2,756 campsites at the 11 designated State Parks which are participating in the program and an additional 2,572 campsites at 42 other State Parks available on a first-come, first-served basis. State Park officials pointed out that a reservation was not necessary to gain a spot in the 11 parks participating in the reservation program. They said that all unreserved or unclaimed reserved campsites at these parks are available to campers without reservations on a first-come, first-served basis.

It was also emphasized that reservations could be made regardless of residence. Reservations must be made at that park at which the campsite is desired. They cannot be made at any other location. A person may pay his camping fees for his entire stay upon arrival at the park. Any unused portion of the fee will be refunded.

Information concerning the various State Parks may be obtained by calling the toll-free Campsite Information number, which is available from any telephone in Oregon. The number is 1-800-452-0294. If one experiences difficulty in dialing this number directly, the local telephone directory should be consulted or the assistance of an operator requested.

The Campsite Information Center will be in operation from May 17 to September 3. Information clerks will be on duty from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday through Friday, to receive calls and provide up-to-date information on the chances of getting a campsite in a State Park. They will also have information on State Park facilities, activities and programs.

A person may cancel his campsite reservations through this toll-free number, but reservations cannot be made through this service.
