Pacific Loses To Gold Beach, 70-45



Each fall, the turning leaves and the descending mercury column signal the approach of legal deer hunting seasons for thousands of American sportsmen, and, even though the 1971 season now lies behind us, we feel that it is nevertheless not too late to dwell upon it.

Unquestionably, the deer is our major big game species. Further, he exists in sufficient numbers throughout the country to provide a valid chance for success to every hunter — usually within the borders of his own state. However, and due to the poor success encountered in many areas during the past open season it appears that each successive season the chances of

the hunter being able to click on a buck, are gradually growing dimmer.

But, despite his numbers and general accessibility, the deer remains one of the most challenging of big game animals in the world.

DEER ARE DIFFERENT
Successful hunting of many other types of big game frequently involves getting to where they are. Distance can be the most difficult obstacle encountered. However, once there, a competent guide or professional hunter can often absolutely guarantee you a trophy. This is rarely the case with deer — that most elusive animal. A hunter can spend an entire week smack in the middle of highly populated deer cover and never see an antler. He may never know he was within 10 yards of one he failed to spot, or that his back trail was crossed a dozen times by wily blacktails or muleys during the course of the hunt. Deer are entirely different from all other game animals in this respect.

DEER FEED AT NIGHT
Under normal conditions deer feed at night and prefer to be safely bedded down in their selected protected cover well before the sun climbs above the tree tops, states those self-called experts. Strange to relate, it is seldom that they mention the effect that the different phases of the moon actually has on deer, so far as their browsing is concerned.

While it is true that deer may be found browsing during the darkest nights as well as during all phases of the moon, at the same time it has always been apparent to veteran hunters that much poorer success is encountered during the times that the moon cruises the skies and especially so at its fullest stages.

KEEP AN EYE ON THE BUNNIES
There is one unflinching sign that may serve to prove of benefit to an observant deer hunter. It is simply this: both deer and rabbits usually are out in the open, feeding at about the same time, so keep an eye peeled for the bunnies. If you are hunting an area frequented by both rabbits and deer, and rabbits are observed in the act of feeding, you can always bank on it that, so are the deer...no bunnies, no deer; might as well return to camp.

DEER ARE WHERE YOU FIND THEM
Deer have the habit of showing up unexpectedly, and at times in places actually by-passed by experienced hunters, such spots considered as poor hunting prospects. This accounts for so many novice hunters bagging deer each season. They being "foolish" enough to look for deer where there's not supposed to be any. There's not a naturalist, a seasoned hunter nor guide that can be found today who can be accorded the distinction of being able to fare forth in the wilderness and show you a buck to shoot down: to absolutely guarantee that he can do so, during the open buck season.

Actually, deer are where you find them, and that is wherever they happen to be at that particular time. No one is capable of leading you straight to 'em.

General Mills Extends Aid

The Kidney Association of Oregon has announced that it has received permission from General Mills, Inc., to continue its statewide collection and redemption of Betty Crocker coupons for an additional 18 months, to provide funds for the KAO program for Oregonians who are victims of kidney failure.

Fish License Return Asked

Sport fishermen are urged by the Game Commission to dig down in their wallets or other places they store hunting and fishing licenses and return their expired 1971 salmon-steelhead license, commonly called the salmon-steelhead record card.

Reino Koski, who has the important task of calculating total salmon and steelhead catch in the state, advised that collection boxes are available at all license agencies for the convenience of the angler. The cards also may be mailed directly to the Game Commission or turned in at any of its five regional offices.

Koski said the record cards provide the basis for calculating the total catch as well as determining the catch by individual streams. He advised anglers that it is important that all cards be returned to provide the most accurate estimate possible of the 1971 salmon-steelhead sport fishery.

Some good catches have been made on the Chetco and Sixes Rivers but even these streams have been too clear and cold for really hot fishing. Most anglers are going to lighter leaders and smaller lures to fool old "ironhead."

Drift fishing has been much more productive than plunking due to the inactivity of the fish in cold water. Drifted eggs or lure and egg combinations

have produced most steelhead. If some good rains are forthcoming this week, the steelhead will become active and the fishing should be excellent if the rivers don't get too high and out of shape.
