

Curry County Formed By Glacial Run-Off

A saga of Siskiyou country is the way Dr. Elmo Stevenson portrayed the geological history of Curry County at the first session of the geology short course. He discussed them as seven chapters covering over 100 million years.

Most of the western United States was under a shallow tropical Pacific Ocean 100 million years ago. Through the centuries shellfish and other animals died and their shells accumulated on the bottom of the ocean. Washing of sand and

small stones from land combined with calcium from the decomposing shells to form cemented layers of conglomerate rock, sandstone and shale. Coze on the ocean floor formed limestone which, under terrific heat and pressure, later became marble.

The second chapter saw the tremendous folding of the earth's crust. The Klamath Mountains (of which the Siskiyou are the local representatives), and the Blue Mountains of northeastern Oregon

were two islands in the still present shallow sea. The cores of these mountains contained granites, diorites and peridotite. The latter is locally called "buckskin boulder" and is a parent material for serpentine. The Rocky Mountains were also thrust up at this time. This was also the period of orogenesis, the depositing of mineral ores in the inner-spaces.

Then followed a period of freshwater lakes in areas cut off from the ocean by upthrust mountains. Erosion took place and filled many of these freshwater lakes. The Rogue Valley near Medford is one of these filled lakes. Some filled with salty minerals from the surrounding country. The Bonville Salt flats and Great Salt Lake are remnants of these lakes.

The next chapter saw the birth of the original Cascades through early volcanism that spread lava and ash over the land. Every few years huge sheets of lava poured out forming the Columbia River basalt. At one point along the Snake River, 283 distinct layers of lava can be seen. This all happened in a period from 20 to 40 million years ago. The rain of ash was so great in portions of eastern Oregon that multitudes of pre-historic elephants, rhinoceri and three-toed horses were encased and fossilized in what we now know as the John Day fossil beds.

In these days, the Siskiyou, Blue Mountains and others were much higher than they are today.

Chapter five saw a period of uplift and crackup. The freshwater lakes became tablelands covered with grass. Faults and fractures caused huge blocks to drop as others raised up. The Albert rim near Lakeview is an outstanding example of this period. In our own area, the San Andreas fault many miles out in the sea, and smaller faults along the Curry coast are examples.

Glaciation had a marked impact on the geology of this area. The glaciers cut basins for lakes and valleys, carved the tops from mountains, and cut rivers such as the Rogue and Umpqua into the landscape. The run-off from these glaciers brought the soil that now forms the coastal benches on which Port Orford, Gold Beach and Brookings now lie, and formed most of the continental shelf. The flood of 1964 was like a trickle compared to these early torrents, said Dr. Stevenson.

The final chapter is one of old age, the recent (six to ten thousand years ago) formation of the "new" volcanic peaks of the Cascades (Mt. Shasta, Mt. Lassen, Mt. McLoughlin, Mt. Jefferson, etc.,)

and continual erosion and modification of the earth's crust.

NEXT LECTURE

One more lecture and a field trip will be held on Friday, April 21, 7:30 p.m., in the Gold Beach City Hall, and on Saturday, April 22, Dr. Stevenson will discuss local geological features including the sea stacks, Otter Point formations, different types of rocks to be found in this area in the lecture, and the field trip will

be to observe these items. Those who missed the first session can still attend the next sessions for a fee of \$4 which will include notes from the first session.

Dr. Stevenson is the president emeritus (retired) of the Southern Oregon College at Ashland, and was also a professor of natural science of education. The course is co-sponsored by the Oregon State Extension Service and the Gold Beach high school. For further information, contact the Curry County Extension Office in Gold Beach.

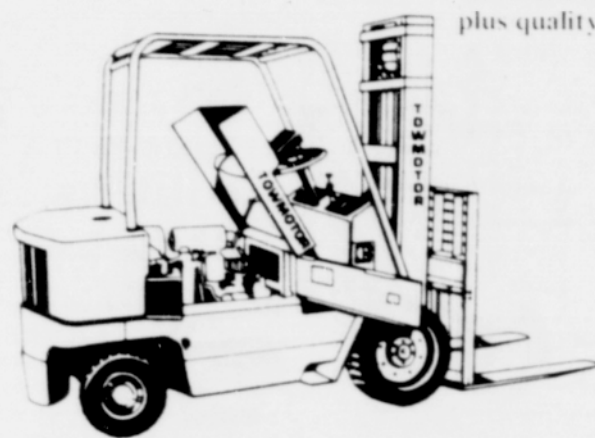
