Mole Control Time Prime

Moles can be controlled and early spring is a good time to do it. The grass is short, new mole workings are easy to see and there is less chance of losing traps in big fields, says Walt Schroeder, Curry county extension agent.

Trapping and poisoning are both effective when properly used, according to Andy Landforce, Oregon State University extension wildlife specialist.

Moles require large quantities of food and spend perhaps half their lives searching for something to eat. Since moles travel back and forth in their burrows searching for food, they are vulnerable to properly used poisonous baits and traps.

The scissor jaw trap is the type recommended and is particularly effective around the garden, lawn and home, and for follow-up trapping in large field poisoning operations. Poisoning can be effective either in small plots or large areas.

Use the scissor jaw trap in main runways, usually found between two mole hills. Cut a hole in the ground large enough to barely accommodate the trap. The hole should be cleaned out. Then, just before placing the trap into the hole, use soil to build a firm plug or dirt mound on the bottom of the runway.

Place a trap so the trigger rests firmly on the plug or dirt mound. The firm plug is needed to help the trigger as the mole passes under it. Insert the plug into the hole and press the trigger pan firmly on the dirt plug with the jaws straddling the runway. Remove the trap safety catch and keep loose dirt onto the set to keep out light.

A properly set trap will be working continuously, but should be checked daily to remove a mole or be sure it hasn't been disturbed, sprung or by-passed. Mole bait containing Thallium Sulphate is an effective poison. Use the bait only in main runways. These runways are from 4 to 8 inches under the surface of the soil.

Use a probe, such as a one-half inch metal rod to locate the runway. Place a small spoonful of poisonous bait in the bottom of the runway, pouring it down the hole made by the probe. After bait is placed in the runway, close the probe hole by pressing the heel against the edges of the hole.

When several mole hills appear on the lawn, place the

bait in runways approximately every ten feet. For large areas such as fields and pastures, poisonous baits should be used at about 20 to 30 feet intervals in the main runways. Application at this rate will kill a high percentage of moles. Wait approximately 72 hours after the first application and then knock down all the old mole hills. It takes about 72 hours for the Thallium Sulphate to be effective. Any activity after 72 hours indicates that some moles have survived or that traveling moles have invaded the area.

Rebait to control only those moles which were missed by the first baiting and are causing the new mole hills. When rebaiting, it's practical to knock the hill over immediately. By so doing, one can see where he has rebaited which helps to do a thorough job.

If new mole hills appear after the second baiting, a third rebaiting may be necessary or the operator may wish to use traps to catch the last few moles.

Hands Off Wildlife

The Oregon Game Commission today issued its annual reminder of "hands off" wildlife and their young of the year. For the next few months these youngsters will be found in their usual hiding places. Fawns will be born, upland game bird chicks will be hatching, waterfowl will be busy raising their young ones. It's the time of year for reproduction to take place as wildlife of all species reproduce their kind. And it is unlawful to molest them or take them home as pets.

Invariably the circumstances under which these woodland creatures are discovered lead some persons to believe that they are orphaned, alone and helpless. This is far from the truth as the parent animal is usually nearby, hiding in fear of the intruder. Adoption and removal from the wild almost always leads to unnecessary death of wild youngsters. Their chances of survival are much greater if they are left alone, unhandled and undisturbed, right where they are discovered.

The young of any species require expert feeding and care and they usually will not survive away from their mothers. Some animals become dangerous to humans as they mature.

Although Oregon fawns are generally born in May and June, this early reminder is to alert outdoor travelers to leave them alone. To molest any wildlife or to take the young home are illegal acts.

This is the word from the disease control section of the Oregon Department of Agriculture's Veterinary Division as spring moves into the picture and the time draws closer for appearance of mosquitoes, the carriers of the disease.

Dr. E. L. Henkel, head of the disease control section, also reminds that in their eagerness to have their animals protected against VEE horse owners should not neglect to also have them inoculated against the Eastern and Western strains of encephalomyelitis, the familiar types of encephalomyelitis, since they can also be devastating.

Henkel said the department had delayed making its recommendation for the vaccination against VEE for all horses regardless of whether there was another outbreak in this country this year until getting more information on the safety of the vaccine.

But studies made by the Veterinary Science Research Division of the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Agricultural Research Service to determine the effect of the vaccine on the central nervous system of horses have shown there is no evidence of damage to either the brain or spinal cord.

According to a report received by the department from the USDA some of the horses checked in the test developed a low fever following vaccination and appeared slightly ill but all of these signs disappeared after 10 days. The report further stated that the test confirmed findings in the field in 1971 when over 2.8 million horses were vaccinated in 19 states and the District of Columbia.

Henkel says practicing veterinarians are equipped to give the vaccinations and reminded that when horses are vaccinated one copy of the vaccination certificate should be sent to the Oregon Department of Agriculture. This is kept on file for use in possible interstate or international shipments of the animals.

Until 1970 VEE had been confined to South America. It was found in Mexico that year and in 1971 the U.S. had its first outbreak of the disease, but it was confined to a 25-county area in Texas.

Vandals Continue Rampage In State's National Forests

Vandalism costs during 1971 in the National Forests of Oregon and Washington decreased almost 10 percent from the previous year.

During 1971, thieves and vandals caused an estimated \$129,000 damage, compared to the 1970 total of \$143,000, according to Regional Forester Rexford A. Resler. The total does not include regular maintenance costs.

Typical examples of vandalism and theft included: Gasoline and batteries stolen from Forest Service vehicles; tools stolen; trees chopped down; signs shot up, smashed, defaced, and stolen; traffic counters destroyed; campground collection boxes smashed and money taken; private cabins burglarized; camps looted; gate locks destroyed by the dozens.

Comfort stations continue to be one of the vandals' favorite targets, with hundreds of them damaged in some way: Burned, chopped, tipped over, dynamited in various recreation sites and some even stolen.

Here is a sampling of some of the 458 incidents of thievery and 720 acts of vandalism during 1971:

A group of unknown individuals went on a destructive rampage one weekend and did over \$3,800 damage by breaking windows in fire buildings and destroyed two toilets with explosives in the Fort Rock Ranger District Deschutes National Forest, Oregon. A drinking party pulled over an entrance sign and burned a bulletin board in the Lakeview Ranger District, Fremont National Forest, Oregon.

Signs valued at \$800 disappeared in the Ape Cave area of the Gifford Pinchot National Forest in Washington. At two campgrounds in the Packwood District of the same Forest, destruction and theft of collection boxes amounted to almost \$260.

A passing hunter discovered and extinguished a fire that had been set under the front porch of the Sunshine fireman station in the Malheur National Forest in Oregon. Damage was only \$50 but could have been much more. In the same Forest, three radios valued at \$2,500 were stolen from government vehicles inside a locked compound.

A more bizarre act of vandalism occurred in the Mt. Baker National Forest, Washington, when a grave was dug up in an Indian cemetery. Theft of garbage cans, picnic tables and fireplace grills was common.

In the Mt. Hood National Forest in Oregon, a firefinder valued at \$275 was stolen from a lookout in the Barlow Ranger District. In the Estacada Ranger District, a person dumped a load of garbage on a logging road. Forest Service personnel wrote a letter to a name found in the litter and informed the man that the police would be notified if the mess was not cleaned up in ten days. (It was cleaned up.)

Over \$600 worth of grass seed was stolen from a locked building at the Crooked River National Grassland headquarters in the Ochoco National Forest, Oregon.

Dynamiting of the Loup Loup Ski Area sign in the Okanogan National Forest in Washington cost \$200. Damage of \$1,000 was tallied when two road graders were vandalized in the Olympic National Forest in Washington. Another \$1,000 worth of damage occurred in the same Forest when gasoline exploded as it was being stolen from a government pickup; three government vehicles in the compound were burned.

In the Rogue River National Forest, Oregon, \$450 worth of saddles and other horse gear was stolen from a guard station. The Siskiyou National Forest, Oregon, sustained \$2,500 in damage to three lookouts in the Galice Ranger District. Windows were broken, locks destroyed at all three lookouts, and furniture and equipment was thrown from the Serpentine Lookout.

The cost of replacing damaged and stolen signs in the Stuslav National Forest in Oregon amounted to almost \$2,000, about 2/5 of the Forest's total vandalism cost for the year.

The Snoqualmie National Forest in Washington reports that the Blue Slide Lookout toppled over a cliff when vandals were cut by malicious vandals, resulting in \$5,000 damage.

Many incidents of stolen signs have been reported which could have endangered hikers and drivers. Such might have been the case when two one-lane bridge signs were stolen in the Umatilla National Forest of Oregon.

The Toketee Airstrip in the Umpqua National Forest of Oregon needed \$200 worth of grading to repair erosion damage caused by cars "squirreling" in the mud during wet weather.

Bald Mountain radar site in

the Willamette National Forest in Oregon was the target of thieves who caused \$2,000 loss in broken windows and theft.

Trail signs received much attention in the Wenatchee National Forest in Washington, many being used for target practice and carving and many disappearing entirely. A handrail was
