Hillclimb Winners

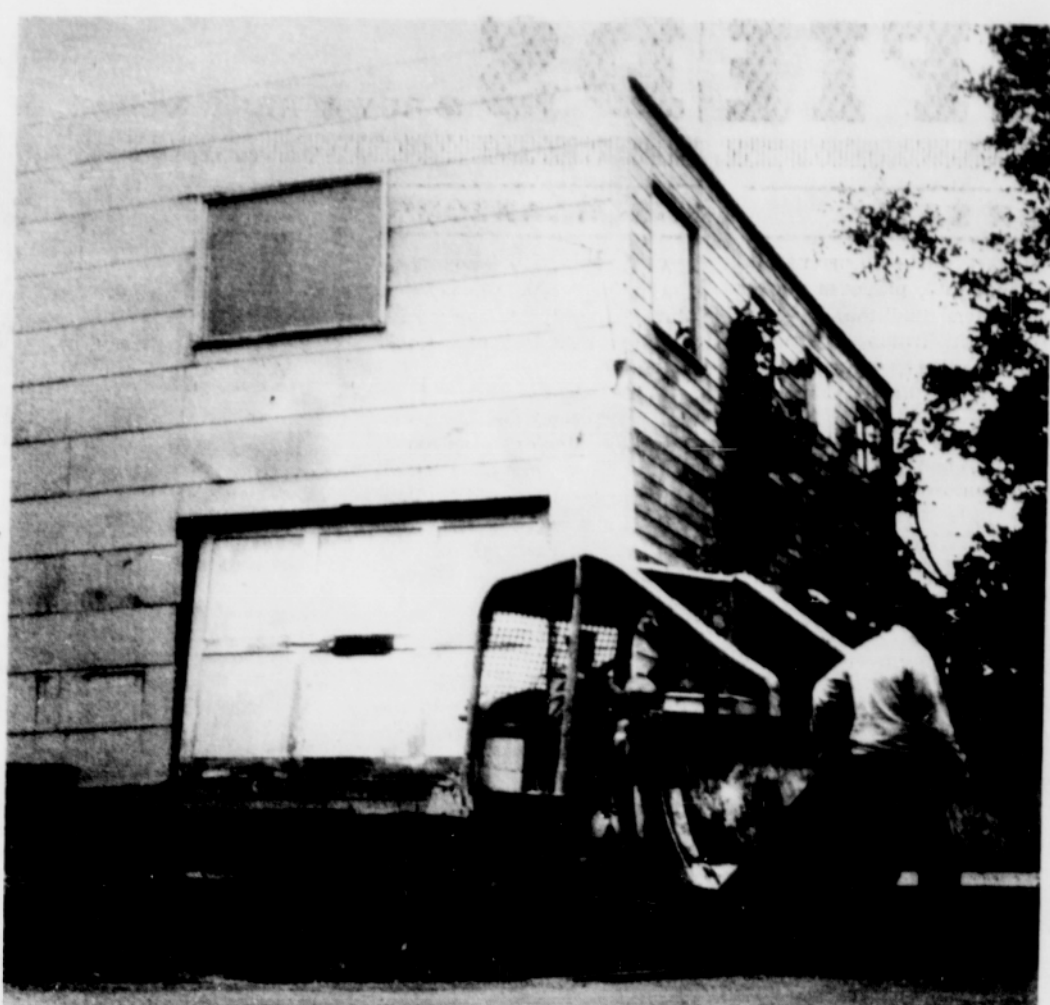

TIMBER HARVEST (From Page-2)

was the highest since 1968 when 9.74 billion board feet was harvested. Western Oregon's log production increased 1.03 billion board feet (up 16.6 percent) to 7.23 billion board feet, and Eastern Oregon's timber harvest increased 332 million board feet (up 18.6 percent) to 2.12 billion board feet.

The total private timber harvest in Oregon was 4.55 billion board feet, the highest since 1960. Forest industry's timberlands production increased 488 million board feet (up 14.0 percent) to 3.98 billion board feet, and nonindustrial "other private" harvest increased 183 million board feet (47.9 percent) to 567 million board feet.

Public agencies' log production in Oregon increased 691 million board feet to 4.80 billion board feet in 1971. National Forests' log production increased 365 million board feet (up 12.9 percent) to 3.20 billion board feet. The Bureau of Land Management's harvest increased 303 million board feet (up 29.2 percent) to 1.34 billion board feet. The timber harvest on State-owned lands increased by 7.89 million board feet to 158 million board feet.

Losses May Be Claimed

An amendment to the Federal tax law signed July 1 by the President allows taxpayers who suffered disaster losses before June 30 of this year to claim those losses on last year's tax return, the Internal Revenue Service announced today.

The change in law was enacted to give relief to victims of the floods that recently ravaged the Midwest and Eastern portions of the country. Under the old law, a disaster had to occur before the end of the income tax filing period, usually April 15, in order for taxpayers to claim the losses on the previous year's returns.

Simultaneously with the announcement of the change in law, the Treasury and the Internal Revenue Service said that the July 15 deadline for claiming disaster losses has been extended. Regulations giving specific details and dates will follow in the near future, the IRS said. The change means that taxpayers who suffered losses in sections of the country declared disaster areas by the President in the first six months of 1972 may file amended returns for 1971. For many taxpayers that would mean a quick tax refund, the IRS said. Form 1040X is used by individuals and Form 1120X by corporations to file amended returns.

In many of those areas hit by floods, the IRS is providing service seven days a week to assist taxpayers in ascertaining the amount of damage and preparing their amended tax returns.

Angler Access Options Taken

Options for the purchase of three access points on popular fishing streams were given approval by the Game Commission recently, one for bank anglers and the other two drift boat launching sites. The three streams include Big Creek in Clatsop County, Smith River and the Coquille River South Fork.

On Big Creek the option obtained is for 13 acres including about 1,500 feet of stream frontage. The area is located along a popular salmon and steelhead section between the new and old U.S. Highway 30. Some improvements will be necessary to provide adequate parking for fishermen.

The Smith River access option includes about three acres just upstream from the head of break apart.

On kapok buoyant cushions, look for torn or missing straps, ruptured heat-sealed containers (holds no air when squeezed gently), waterlogged pads (these feel hard-packed when squeezed) or torn covers which expose the interior kapok containers.

Given proper care, life preservers will last many years. They should be dried after use and stored in a dry, well-ventilated place (but always where they are readily available for an emergency).

Like seatbelts in autos, life preservers make a life or death difference when an accident occurs. But they may be useless unless they have been cared for.

And they are absolutely no good if they aren't worn.

Albacore tuna have made an early appearance in Oregon coastal waters according to the Fish Commission of Oregon's chartered research vessel Mitol. Larry Hreha, Fish Commission biologist in charge of albacore investigations, today reported a catch of 13 albacore 120 miles west of Cape Lookout on July 3, eight in the same position further north on July 4 and eight fish on July 5 only 70 to 120 miles west of Tillamook Head. A research vessel operated by the American Fishermen's Research Foundation hooked 40 albacore before noon on July 5, 150 miles west of Cape Blanco, adding confirmation to the presence of substantial schools of albacore off Oregon's coast.

With thousands of accidental poisonings occurring each year, primarily among children under age five, parents should strive to keep all non-food products stored out of children's sight and reach. This especially true of medicines, petroleum products such as lighter fluid, dishwashing liquids,

Mainly for Mothers

POISONING OR UPSET STOMACH?

A mother found her three-year-old son crying in the bathroom. Noticing the half-empty container by his side, she correctly assumed her son had just swallowed some of mommy's hand lotion. The mother grabbed him up and drove off in haste for the hospital emergency room.

Any mother might have reacted in the same way, often the wrong way. Her correct response would have been to 1) note the substance and amount ingested and 2) call the local poison control center, her pediatrician or the hospital emergency room. She would have learned that most hand lotions are non-toxic, avoided the mental anguish and the risk of an automobile accident while driving to the hospital.

The Council on Family Health, sponsored by the manufacturers of medicines as a public service, urges mothers to be aware that many common household products are relatively safe if ingested by children. The list, according to the Council, includes: perfume (in normally small volume), shampoo, liquid makeup, floor wax, birth control pills, indoor paints, toy pistol caps, plastic putty and vitamins (though not iron pills).

But, the Council adds, it is equally important to know what action should be taken in an accident situation. The Council suggests to all mothers that they keep the telephone numbers of the doctor, hospital, poison control center and police emergency center close to the phone. The fast advice of a trained expert can be worth a great deal.



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
