SOUTH COAST
"Anglin"

With ocean conditions near excellent last week, many fishermen went offshore for salmon with high hopes. The catch, however, has been disappointing out of both Gold Beach and Brookings. A few nice chinook and coho have been taken but most anglers have been taking bottom fish only offshore. The salmon have been steadily moving in closer and the success is expected to pick up soon.

Luckily, for frustrated salmon anglers, bottom fishing has been good in most areas. Good catches of ling cod, red and black snapper, greenling or sea trout, china rockfish and other rockfish have been landed on the south coast. Rock fishing will help take up the slack until the main salmon fishery picks up.

Anglers in the Port Orford area report that trout fishing in Garrison Lake is still good. Flies in the evening are reported to be very effective.

A few very nice sea-run cutthroat have been taken in the Rogue estuary. This fishery produces some of the nicest cutthroat taken on the south coast. Small spinners, lures and bullhead, or cottid, meat produces best. Success usually varies with the tide in the individual areas.

Perch fishing has been fair to good from the jetties in the Rogue estuary.

OUTDOOR
RAMBLINGS

More than a year ago a number of hunters from various states - two of them Oregonians, one a resident of Coos County - engaged in a hunt for Desert Sheep in the state of California. A registered guide, a resident of that state was engaged by the group. His services rendered the hunters proved to be of an explosive nature - read on.

Each one in the party of out-of-state nimrods - numbering a dozen or more - were successful in bagging fine specimens of that rare animal. In fact, the Coos County sportsman succeeded in downing two of 'em. A fine supply of real wild mutton.

The hunters involved were secure in their belief that the hunt had been conducted in a lawful manner in every respect. However, they were in for the surprise of their lives. Sometime later, due to the guide having failed to provide the necessary game tags required for the kills made, each of the successful hunters were apprehended, summoned before a magistrate and fined the sum of \$500 each for having failed to tag the game animals slain.

Wow! Enough to make any sheep hunter feel "sheepish" is it not, even though the unlawful act committed was no fault of the hunters, but that of the guide, who failed to provide the legal game tags.

CASE REVIVED

But, you ain't heered nothin' yet, for after paying the \$500 fine by each individual involved in the hunt, and their peace of mind having been restored to the extent that they believed that was the end of that particular expensive hunt, imagine their surprise - if you can - and no doubt their consternation, when, out-of-the-blue, they were notified that the state of California has revived the case, and is asking \$15,000 damage and \$5,000 for the value of each sheep slain, to the people of California; not from the hunters as a group, but from each person involved in the affair. Should judgment be declared against the hunters in the California courts,

the fine assessed each individual would be the ridiculous sum of \$20,000, plus the previous fine assessment of \$500; that is, with the exception of the Coos County resident - hunter who bagged two of the "golden" desert sheep.

WILD MUTTON COMES HIGH

Each individual hunter having already punned up 500 bucks for the previous offense committed, if adjudged guilty on the new charge he now faces, would be really paying a fantastic price for mutton per pound. But the Coos County sportsman - having slain two sheep - would be the real "goat" in the sheep deal. It probably would cost him twice the amount of the fine leveled against the other members of the group, the amount being a grand total of \$40,000. Add to that the amount of the fine paid for the first offense, plus traveling expenses and attorney fees, it would no doubt succeed in establishing a new world record as being the highest amount ever yet recorded pertaining to a game law violation in the U.S. as well as all other countries of our so-called civilized world of today.

To date we have failed to hear what action the law has taken against the guide that conducted members of the party on the sheep hunt, for as previously stated - our informant being a reliable person - he failed to supply the hunters in his charge at that time, with official tags supposed to be entrusted to him by game officials. If so, it stands to reason that the guide should be apprehended and placed on trial himself, for according to the report forwarded us, he is really the one that should be held responsible for the violation committed instead of the hunters, or at least partly so. But regardless of the outcome of the trial if, and when it eventually is held, it causes one to wonder that if the wide-spread publicity accorded it, regardless as to whether the hunters are found guilty or not, just what the effect such a trial will have upon judges that dote

out sentences to game violators, to be found across the nation? Will the precedent set by the California courts - the tremendous boost in the matter of fines - serve to influence all J.P.'s, and magistrates to boost fines assessed against game violators in a likewise manner? Probably not, for magistrates as a whole may rightfully be regarded as level-headed persons, but only time will tell.

Big Game Books Out

Big game hunters are advised that regulations covering the 1972 big game seasons are now available in booklet form and may be obtained at all license agencies. In addition to seasons and bag limits, the booklet contains rules on arms and ammunition, possession and transportation of game animals, and other general hunting regulations.

Nimrods are urged to check carefully the procedures required for filing applications for special tags and permits. Full instructions will be found in the booklet. Hunters are also reminded that to be eligible for the drawings, applications for special tags and permits must be received at the Game Commission's Portland headquarters by 5 p.m. on the deadline date.

The rule does not mean that hunters cannot file applications after the deadline, but with the great interest in the limited number of special tags and permits this season, it is doubtful that late applicants will have much chance. Only if surplus tags or permits are available following the drawings will late applications be considered.
