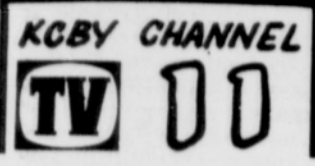

OUTDOOR RAMBLINGS By Lans Laneve

Your favorite rifle or shotgun will last a lifetime if given care. Routine maintenance includes keeping the action clean and lightly lubricated. Too much lubricant attracts dirt and can cause moving parts to become sluggish.

Most American-made ammunition has been produced with nonmercuric and non-corrosive primers for many years, and guns fired with this type of ammo do not need to be cleaned after every firing, but in spite of this being claimed by both ammunition and gun dealers, this old hunter continues to clean his guns regardless of advice to the contrary. There's one thing for sure, and that is, that it most certainly will not prove harmful to clean the bore of any gun after it has been fired.

RUST PROBLEMS If you have been after waterfowl on salt water or any kind of a hunt where your gun gets wet, take particular care to wipe down the metal parts and lubricate them lightly. Otherwise you may have a rust problem. Be sure to always clean the bore of a gun after it has been exposed to such conditions as mentioned.

Give your gun an extra careful inspection and cleaning several times a year, particularly before you put it away for any length of time.

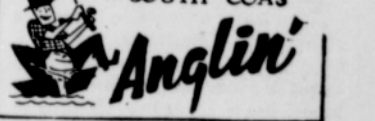

by Jim Martin Summer steelheading on the lower Rogue picked up over the weekend from a slight slump late last week. More of the larger steelhead are starting to show up in the catch. In addition, the anglers using eggs and spinners are cashing in on the bonus of jack salmon with an occasional adult salmon being taken on the river. A few anglers have been catching an occasional sea-run cutthroat or harvest trout while fishing for steelhead. Some summer steelhead have been reported in the lower Illinois River. A few good catches have been reported.

Offshore salmon fishing has generally been poor, with windy ocean conditions causing problems. A few large chinook are still being caught offshore. Although the volume of the catch is only fair to poor, some of the fish are running near 50 pounds.

cutthroat trout fishing is expected to pick up very nicely soon in most of the streams of the south coast. Good reports have been received from anglers fishing lower Pistol River, Chetco, Rogue and Sixes Rivers.
