Makes Office Staff Change

Congressman John Dellenback has announced the appointment of David H. Lohman to be his new Oregon Representative. Lohman replaces Don Powell, who has been the Oregon Representative for four years. Powell plans to travel for several months in western Europe.

In accepting Powell's resignation, Dellenback said, "Don Powell has done an outstanding job of helping me maintain contact with my constituents. His dedication to his work and particularly to being aware of and serving the needs of all the people of this district makes me especially sorry to see him go."

SWOCC Art Development Means More Jobs For Rural Youth Show Set

The first general public exhibition of works of art created by students at Southwestern Oregon Community College will be held during the month of February. It was announced this week by the SWOCC Fine Arts Club. The exhibit will begin with an open reception at 7 p.m. Saturday, Feb. 3 on fourth floor of Tioga Hall on the campus. The exhibition will continue through Feb. 28.

Qualified exhibitors include daytime and evening students currently enrolled in art courses at the college, as well as students who were enrolled during winter, spring, summer and fall terms, 1972. Also eligible to exhibit are persons enrolled in SWOCC art classes at the North Bend Annex, Reedsport high school, Dune Daubers Studio, and River's End Gallery. All work must have been done under SWOCC

Rural families will be able to stay closer together in the future because of the opportunities possible through rural development.

Instructor supervision during 1972-73.

Entries will be accepted in Tioga Hall on Feb. 1 and 2. Only those entries selected by the judges will be placed on exhibition. All entries must be appropriately framed, matted or mounted. Up to three original works may be submitted by each exhibitor in each of the following categories: drawing, painting, ceramics, printmaking, basic design, watercolor, sculpture, and alligraphy.

Work will be judged for "Best of Show," and for first and second placings in each of eight categories. Awards will be presented at the opening night reception.

Rural development simply means "making rural America a better place to live and work," says William Erwin, Deputy Under Secretary of Agriculture for Rural Development. He adds, "A lot of people in rural areas are tired of watching their young people move away to cities to find work."

Thirty-four percent of the people surveyed in a poll said they would prefer to live in open country. Yet only 12 percent live there. This indicates that many men and women living in the city today would much rather be back in the country where they started, if only they could find a decent job. Some return even without one, so disillusioned are they with city life.

One rural community made special efforts to train its youth

for "export"—for specific jobs available in surrounding cities. But even with such preparation, 25 out of 40 graduates of the program turned around and went back home.

"City life simply wasn't for them," said Mr. Irwin, who on Jan. 4, was nominated by President Nixon to fill the new post of Assistant Secretary of Agriculture for Rural Development.

One rural development effort local people can undertake is to try to create more jobs in their local areas. That way, young people don't have to leave.

The deputy under secretary has talked to thousands of rural people across the country about rural development. "When you talk about rural development in a little community, people often say 'we don't want those big city problems brought out

here,'" he reports. "But when you say 'how about giving your sons and daughters a chance to stay home,' they get enthusiastic about development."

Figures bear out the importance of a greater variety of jobs to all rural people, farmers as well as nonfarmers. For instance, 62 per cent of farmers make more money from off-farm work than they clear from their farm business.

In fact, more farmers, as well as their sons and daughters, are finding a job in local industry a good way to hold on to the rural way of life they like while enjoying incomes that come closer to matching city levels.
