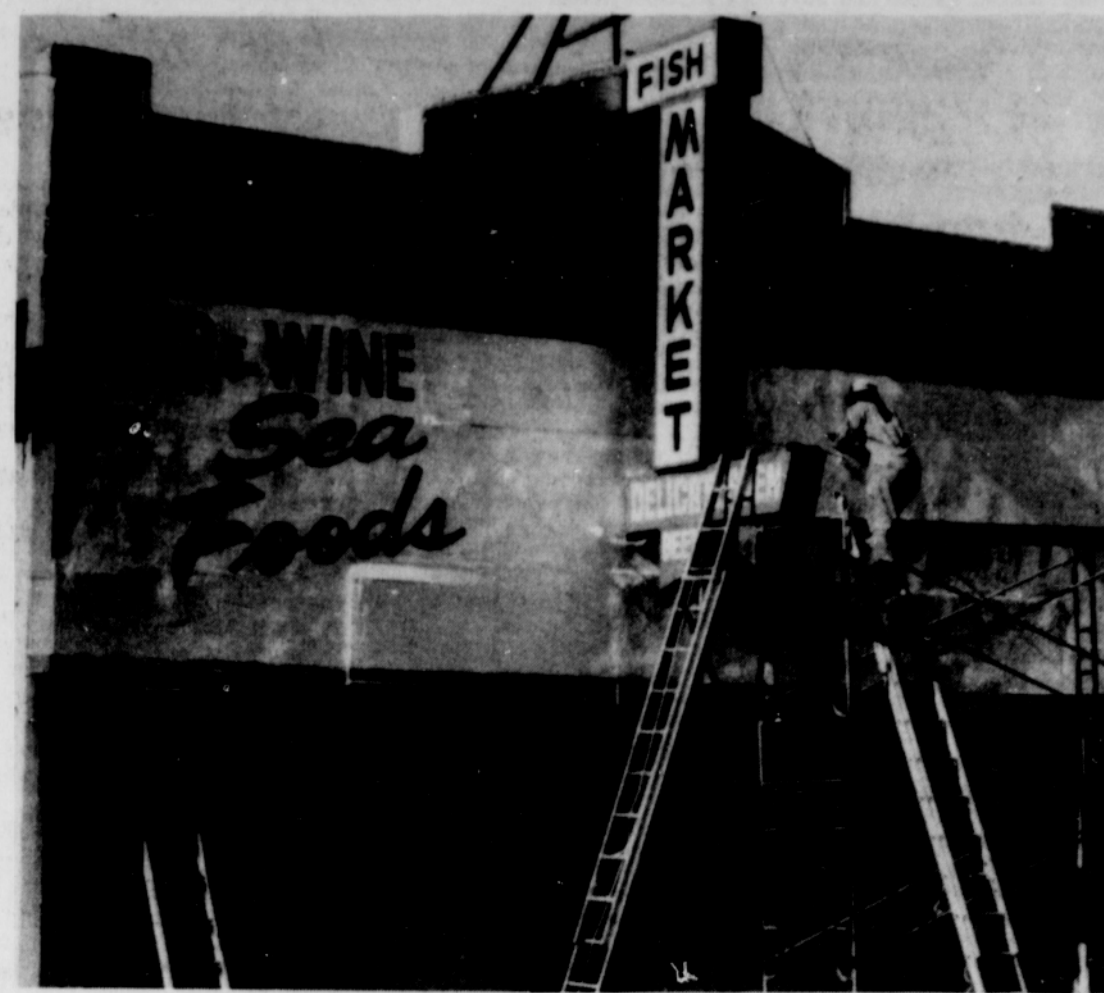

Farmers To Report Fuel Shortages To Counties

To assure a more equitable supply of fuel to farmers this season, the U. S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) is asking farmers to report any shortages to local Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS) offices, according to Carl Holland Jr., local county executive director. Curry county farmers are requested to call ASCS in Gold Beach, 247-7930 on Monday and Tuesday and 247-7011 Ext. 226 on Wednesday, Thursday and Friday. Coos county farmers may call Coquille 396-3121 Ext. 274.

Since February the USDA has been monitoring the farm fuel supply situation through its more than 2,800 ASCS county offices. Any shortages are reported immediately through state ASCS offices to Washington. In addition, a regular farm fuel situation report is prepared for Secretary of Agriculture Earl L. Butz every Wednesday.

Any problems that arise are forwarded immediately to the Office of Oil and Gas (OOG), U.S. Department of the Interior, for solution under the voluntary allocation program. William E. Simon, Chairman of the President's Oil Policy Committee and Deputy Secretary of the Treasury, has pointed out that farmers and the food industry have priority in getting petroleum products. To assure continuous coordination with the OOG, ASCS has loaned it a professional employee.

ASCS said some suppliers

have not been able to meet Farm customers' needs fully. Holland said this is partly because independent and cooperative fuel producers and marketers have not been able to obtain enough supplies.

The current harvesting period is critical to farm production. ASCS officials involved will do follow-ups on shortages reports to make certain that corrective action is being taken.

USDA has been working with the Department of Treasury and the Interior to encourage farm fuel conservation practices. Farmers can conserve fuel use by keeping tractors tuned and using minimum tillage practices, for example.

USDA officials also urged farmers not to buy more fuel than they need in the near future. Officials stressed that equitable distribution is necessary if all farmers are to have enough fuel.

Coast Guard Will Fight Pollution

If you notice a couple of Coast Guardsmen in town in the next few weeks asking questions about the local beach areas, don't worry, they're not planning an invasion. But they are preparing for a struggle against pollution.

They are among a group of almost 100 Coast Guard Reservists on active duty in the Oregon and Washington coastal areas who are working on a contingency plan to be used in case of pollution incidents.

Two groups of reservists will spend two weeks each on the month-long project. They will visit coastal and river front areas to note the type of terrain, determine the best access roads to beach areas, locate and catalogue sources of

Students that were in grades three through seven this year may participate in the program by reading a number of

various kinds of books at his own reading level. After the program is completed, the successful readers will be rewarded with a trip to Pony Village to buy books with their award money.

On June 21, at 10 a.m., a "get acquainted with the library and sign-up party" will be held to launch the reading program. Both age groups are invited to attend and adults will be available to aid the children. The regular story hour for the younger group will follow at 11 a.m.

It is anticipated that the new library facilities will be open before the reading program begins so that many more children

can comfortably join in the story hour. New books for all ages and interests are expected very soon. Nearly 40 children were involved in the summer reading program during its first session a year ago, and more are expected this year, a library board member said.
