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GRANGE NEWS

Sixes Grange met Saturday evening, May 26, with George McDonald in the chair. Mrs. Billings, agriculture chairman, who was absent, had asked at the last meeting that each member tell how their garden was growing. Many reported that their gardens were up and doing real well. McDonald told how in Nome they plant and had vegetables to eat in three weeks time, saying that the sun shone all day and most of the night, and how well warm springs warmed the ground.

In his report, legislative chairman C. H. Brooks gave an outline of a new proposed tax plan now under study at the State Legislature which should, in its final draft, include some decrease in home owner taxes, and could include an increase in income and corporation tax to balance out the different. He explained that if passed, the bill will be passed as a law and would probably go into effect soon after adjournment. He also said the emergency clause cannot be on any revenue-raising measure which gives the people the opportunity to refer it to a vote of the people if the required number of voter names are presented by petition.

He also explained the passing of HR 1975 by Congress and signed by the President which provides for five percent loans to farmers who can prove they cannot obtain a loan anywhere else. He also told of the "Older American Act" which grants close to a billion dollars over the next three years to states for social and other services for the elderly. National Grange Master John

Scott and his assistants have been deeply involved in seeing that adequate tractor fuel is available for producing the agriculture crops necessary for human and livestock food. He also said the loan program for rural power and telephone Senate bill 394 had been passed by a heavy majority vote in both the House and Senate and seemed assured of the President's signature.

Kathryn Rice gave a report for the women's activity committee. The group had served dinner for Western States, had a table at the Flea Market and did very well for the grange.

Jim Billings, who is in the service, asked to be reinstated and was voted back into the grange. When he and his buddies learned how the grange was collecting stamps and sending them to help the needy children, he wanted to help with the collecting for the children. Dick and Clara Erwin, who have sold their property and are moving to Jacksonville to be near their daughter and grandson, resigned their offices.

Mr. and Mrs. Johnson were elected to fill the vacancies left by the Erwins, with she to be secretary and he to be steward. Mrs. Lynch of Port Orford served as lecturer in place of Belva McDonald who was ill.

Mrs. Lynch told of serving the grange in Lakeview where the large amount of farmers were Irish, in Colorado and among the Basque people in Idaho where many of their houses were built underground. She worked with over 200 granges during the time she worked with granges.
