Forest Fire Season Is On

Effective at 12:01 a.m. Monday, June 18, the official forest fire season began in zones 1 and 12 of the Coos Forest Protective Association. Those wishing permits should call several days in advance from when they want to burn to allow ample time for warden inspection. This closure includes all the coastal area.

Industry Tab Is Underway

The biennial census of Oregon industry is underway. Manufacturing establishments in the state are being surveyed by the State Economic Development Division to obtain information for the 1974 edition of the Directory of Oregon Manufacturers.

Most firms will receive a computer print-out of their listing in the 1972 directory, according to Edward J. Whelan, director of the Economic Development Division. They are being asked to revise the listing to reflect current information.

New companies established since the 1972 directory was compiled will receive a short questionnaire.

The biennial directory is much in demand as a guide to buyers seeking Oregon sources of supply. It is also used as a research tool.

Port Sets Meeting With Army Engineers

The Port of Port Orford will meet with a representative of the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers at the regular Port meeting on July 17 to hear a report on preliminary data from the model study of the local harbor. The study is being made at the Waterways Experiment Station in Vicksburg, Mississippi, to determine current action in the local harbor. Completed results of the tests are expected to provide Engineers with information necessary to remedy the shoaling problem here.

Col. Paul D. Triem, District Engineer, said that mem-

bers of his staff would like to meet with port commissioners and other interested parties at the July meeting. SANDWICK HERE

The Sandwick, an agitation type sand moving barge, arrived in port Tuesday to begin moving sand from a channel parallel to the dock but ran into problems with moorings in the harbor. Port president Leo Phillips said the skipper of the Sandwick told him it was not possible to begin operations with boats and moorings in present locations. He requested they be moved... or he won't begin

clearing the channel. Dock manager Ervin Severns was instructed to inform boat owners to remove the moorings for the duration of the sand moving, a period of four or five days.

PARKING ORDINANCE

The port agreed to have attorney Maurice Engleau draft an ordinance governing parking in the area reserved for sport fishermen. The new law is expected to stipulate no overnight parking, unauthorized parking (by persons other than sport fishermen), and provide

penalties. Permission to regulate parking in the area was delegated to The Dock, Inc., by a recent contract.

An ordinance will also be drafted to regulate use of the floating sport boat dock. Penalties will be imposed for leaving dinghys on the dock, or tied to the west side. The dock was installed for the use of sport boats only, the port stressed, but commercial fishermen have been allowed to tie the dinghys to the east side of the floats, under the main fish dock.

MORE PARKING

Port Engineer Dick Nored reported that an application has been filed with the State Marine Board for funds in the amount of \$19,800 to re-shape the bank north of the small boat ramp and to pave the entire area designated for recreational parking, west and south of the corner of The Dock, Inc., building.

REPAIRS DUE

Phillips reported that another \$2,000 worth of dock planing has been ordered and will be placed in critical areas in the near future. Replacing of a few piles is also being planned as soon as the pile driver is put back in action.

Topping the repair program list will be the south end of the dock leased by Cal-Shell. The firm is planning to install an ice chipper and another hoist.

MANAGER RESIGNS

The dock manager notified the commissioners that he was resigning the position and will go commercial fishing. The port will accept applications to fill the vacancy, prior to July 1. The manager was also given permission to hire two high school youths for a cleanup project in the dock and parking area, and to replace the brake on the boat hoist.

OTHER BUSINESS

In other business the port agreed to have the two Sanicans repaired; to send a bill to the boat Paul C of Crescent City for replacement of a piling the boat allegedly backed into and broke during the latter part of March; and to refer insurance claims for medical assistance arising from the truck accident at the dock.

Bills in the amount of \$2,921.15 were approved for payment.

Horse games for both youngsters and adults will get underway at the horse arena located in Buffington Memorial Park on 14th. The event will be under the direction of the Curry County Mounted Sheriff's Posse. The contests are expected to be finished at 5 p.m.

DINGHY RACES

The Lions Club will be in charge of the annual dinghy races at Battle Rock Beach, beginning at 1:30 p.m. Thrills and spills are usual fare for contestants as they battle the surf, rowing out to a buoy and returning to the beach.

FISHING CONTEST

A Jetty Fishing Contest, sponsored by The Dock, Inc. begins at 2 p.m. Prizes will be awarded in three divisions in the hour attempt to catch the biggest bottom fish. First prize for adults will be a ball-bearing reel; juniors will get

a spinning rod; beginners will win a tackle box. Age limits are 14 years up for adults, 8 to 13 for juniors, and up to 7 for beginners, who must be accompanied by an adult. Second and third prizes in all divisions will be \$1.50 worth of tackle, and \$1 worth of tackle. SALMON BARBECUE
