

Oregon Today

Governor McCall has the flare of a showman and often overstates his case. The recent report of the Governor's Energy Task Force combined with his most dramatic press conference probably did what few others could have accomplished. The people of Oregon are talking about the energy crisis and when the Governor of Oregon says that maybe we will have to turn off television sets from 5 to 7 in the afternoon he knows that he can attract attention to some what more conservative solutions that might have more chance of success. For example, we might well find ourselves cutting the speed limits for motor vehicles in the state and this one act would save a tremendous amount of fuel.

The Portland Oregonian commented in a Sunday supplement that the Governor's Task Force was too environmentally oriented for their liking and was more concerned with cutting down on the consumption of energy rather than finding new sources.

It seems fairly clear that we will probably have to do both. We live in a planet of limited resources. We cannot build bigger and bigger cars or have an unlimited supply of new electric gadgets without someday reaching a day of reckoning. On the other hand we must recognize that there are choices to be made in terms of new sources of energy and though each has its own drawbacks, some are preferable to others. Nuclear power, new hydro - electric dams and as we are discovering recently even turbines all create environmental problems, but hard choices have to be made. It is no answer to say that someday we will have fusion power or geothermal power in adequate quantities, or even solar power because none of these wonderful new sources that are on the horizon will supply the needs of today's industrial plants.

Who should be making some of the hard choices in this whole public policy area of energy? The Governor is on the right track when he created the energy task force because this is a recognition that in the last analysis the public through its government will have to make the decisions. When the Oregon Environmental Counsel sues to stop Trojan Nuclear Power Plant or on the other hand the Western Environmental Trade Association sues to require the building of the PGE turbine plant we get public policy made on a piece-meal basis.

Probably the most that this session of the legislature can do in its last few days is to give the Governor such additional authority as he may need to deal with crises that may arise between now and the next legislative session. The Governor and the Legislature should join together to create a permanent commission or committee assigned the task of forging a more permanent energy policy for this state with the help of substantial citizen participation and involvement.

Timber Sold
District Ranger F. W. Burgess announced the sale of timber from an area on the Gold Beach Ranger District of the Siskiyou National Forest. The apparent high bidder for the Phytophthora Salvage timber sale on June 11, 1973, was Ocean Terminals Company. The advertised price was \$333.20 per MBF for Port Orford-Cedar and \$23.11 per MBF for Douglas-fir and other coniferous species. Ocean Terminals Company bid \$333.50 per MBF for Port Orford-Cedar. All other items were sold at a fixed rate as advertised. One other bid was submitted by Tamco, Inc. No bids were submitted on Rogue Residue which was offered for sale on June 12, at 10:00 a.m.
