

posal, and eastern and southern Oregon and the coast opposing the plan.

SB 324 which changes the Public Utilities Commission from a one-man post to a commission of three members, won reconsideration in the Senate after efforts to scuttle the bill in conference committee -- after it had won approval in both House and Senate. Senator Ripper led the proponents in gathering the 20 votes needed to support reconsideration to concur, and the bill passed into law.

The budget for the new Economic Development Commission, was passed by the full committee of Ways and Means, to encourage economic development especially in downstate Oregon. The committee did delete the request for special projects program which relates to the attraction of motion picture productions to Oregon. This was done on the thought that this program could be financed with highway revenues set aside for promotion purposes.

On the negative side, George Baldwin of the Highway Division has informed us of the delay in bids on the Powers highway due to the strike of the Operating Engineers against the Association of General Contractors. Bids on this much needed project will be let as soon as the strike is ended. Also in Contact with the Highway Division, Ed Stevenson reports that the dangerous access at the south end of the Chetco Bridge is to be remedied with additional lane markers. Count and observation through the summer traffic will be made to decide if other action needs to be taken on this critical intersection.

Dredge Move Is Opposed

Sen. Mark Hatfield and Fourth District Congressman John Dellenback have joined in opposition to the reassignment of the dredge "Davison" from the Oregon coast if such a move would reduce dredging activity in the Northwest.

Reports have circulated which indicate that the dredge may be moved to the Great Lakes.

Hatfield and Dellenback said that unless the Army Corps of Engineers can guarantee that money will be available for contracts with private industry for necessary dredging so that operations can be maintained at current levels, the hopper dredge should be left in the Northwest.

In a letter to Army Corps Chief Engineer Lt. Gen. S. J. Clarke, they pointed out that dredging operations in the Northwest became severely backlogged during the Davison's six years of service off South Vietnam. It was recently returned to Oregon service.

Availability of the Davison is important because of the four hopper dredges to which the Corps has access, three are too large to enter smaller Oregon coastal ports.

The two Oregon lawmakers told Gen. Clarke that "in those instances where private industry has the resources to do the work, we strongly support their doing it."

Both agreed that precipitous reassignment of the Davison without alternative plans to eliminate the dredging backlog could have negative long-range economic effects on Oregon.
