They probably won't make you feel any better, but for what they're worth here are a few meat items from that year, as was found in local markets:

One store listed ground beef at 2 lbs for .98, bacon at 2 lbs for .79, sausage for .39 per lb. Ham was at .59 the lb. Beef liver was .39, pot roasts were going for .49. Bacon ends and pieces were 6 lbs for \$1. And for .69 a lb you could pack home all the sirloin, rib and t-bone steak you could carry out of the store.

And that wasn't too long after you could get a dinner at the Orford Cedar Room on Saturday night for .99 that included a t-bone, fries, salad and a hunk of garlic bread! Who says the "good ol' days" weren't really so good?

### MOVING TOWARD PENSION REFORM

Many older Americans have learned too late that their pension plans were not all they expected them to be. Congress is now taking a penetrating look at the various kinds of pension plans and is attempting to find ways to protect workers against lost pension benefits.

Early in July I joined several of my colleagues on the House Education and Labor Committee in cosponsoring the Multiprotection of Employee Retirement Income and Trust (MERIT) Act. As proposed, MERIT would impose tighter restrictions on fiduciaries (people who manage pension funds), require that certain necessary information be provided to participants regarding their rights and benefits, require meaningful reports be filed with the Department of Labor, and provide for strengthened enforcement of laws.

Those of us who have joined in sponsoring the MERIT plan do not see it as being a perfect piece of legislation. It does, however, provide a solid piece of legislative groundwork from which the Special Subcommittee on Labor can proceed to develop a comprehensive pension bill. It is the result of five years of continuing study by the Subcommittee which completed hearings on pension reform in March.

Because any discussion of the issue can become very complicated, I will attempt here only to touch on some of the major areas of concern with respect to pension reform.

**VESTING** -- Vesting means giving a pensioner the right to receive a portion of his pension if he leaves his job before retirement. At the present, the majority of privately employed individuals lose all rights to any pension if they leave a job prior to retirement.

**PORTABILITY** -- Should a pensioner be able to have his pension rights transferred if he makes one or more job changes during his career?

**INSURANCE** -- Should private businesses or employers carry insurance to make sure they will be able to meet their pension obligations?

**PRIVATE PLANS** -- There will be some workers who will want to set up their own individual pension plans. It may be necessary to allow tax credits to those workers who choose to invest their own money.

There have been a number of suggested approaches to pension reform. The MERIT legislation represents a comprehensive approach which recognizes the tremendous growth of pension and profit sharing plans over the last 25 years.

Some workers have not received the pension that they have worked for and expected. With MERIT we attempt to right that kind of wrong and prevent any recurrence. The legislation would also serve to encourage more employers to establish pension plans for their workers.

There have been a number of approaches to pension reform suggested to the Congress, including one recently advocated by Ralph Nadar and introduced by Sen. Philip Hart of Michigan. While all the measures seek the same general goals, the approach and the aspects chosen to be emphasized vary from bill to bill.

Because the issue is complicated by its many facets, no single solution is obvious. It is a matter that will require making some hard choices between various legislative alternatives. It is my hope that the MERIT approach will prove popular enough and comprehensive enough to serve as the vehicle in the House of Representatives that will carry us to a legislative solution to this very difficult problem.

HB 2625 and HB 2627 -- allowing cities to exclude themselves from city-county consolidation and expand boundaries until 1979 and to avoid consolidation to preserve lower tax rates respectively also attracted gubernatorial ire. McCall termed both "piecemeal disruption of the city-county consolidation concept."

HB 2747 -- requiring state agencies to retain mineral rights to state lands sold or transferred was vetoed because the state already has such powers and McCall believes it would put the state at a disadvantage in some land transactions.

HB 2751 -- allowing door-to-door canvassing to register voters. The governor fears such a procedure could be used to partisan advantage.

HB 2774 -- transferring assets of dissolved cooperatives to the Board of Higher Education instead of the common school fund. McCall called it an "opening wedge for other diminutions of the present requirement abandoned property be used to enhance the common school fund."

HB 2881 -- creating a 50-mile offshore fishery conservation zone. The governor called it "totally unenforceable" without a naval force and actually the responsibility of the federal government.

## Academy Men Being Sought

Senator Mark O. Hatfield, R-Oregon, announced that he is accepting applications for nominations for appointment in 1974 entering class of Cadets in the U. S. Air Force Academy, the U. S. Naval Academy, the U. S. Military Academy (West Point), and the U. S. Merchant Marine Academy.

To qualify for the competition, an applicant must be unmarried and must have reached his 17th but not his 22nd birthday by June 30, 1974. The minimum educational requirement is a high school diploma; however, high school seniors assured of graduation by June 30, 1974, are eligible to compete.

Senator Hatfield emphasized that the competitive nomination method is employed in the selection of nominees. Using this method, ten nominations are submitted to each academy based on the applicant's high school scholastic and extracurricular activities as well as employment record (and preparatory school or college record, if applicable), letters of recommendation, and the results of the College Entrance Examination Board tests. This method, Hatfield continued, is the fairest possible means of selecting Oregon's finest young men.

## Traffic Up

Traffic volume on most of Oregon's highways showed an increase in vehicular traffic in April, 1973 compared to April, 1972, according to the monthly report compiled by the Oregon State Highway Division. A summary of traffic record data for rural and urban state highways showed an increase of 11.2 per cent in vehicular traffic in April, 1973 compared to April, 1972.

The first four months of 1973 showed an increase of 10.5 per cent in vehicular traffic compared to the first four months of 1972.
