Curry Home Extension Program Announced

Have fun learning new ways to become a more effective homemaker by taking part in the Curry county extension programs. Study group members keep current on all related phases of family care, community development and homemaking. Organized study groups during the month of September and throughout the coming year will be seeking new members. One new study group is being formed in the Langlois area under the direction of Mrs. Charles Jensen.

All homemakers who wish to participate in the home extension program should call Dora Rumsey, Curry county extension agent. The telephone number is 247-7011, extension 226; 469-4600, extension 226, or Commerce 9213.

Projects to be featured are: September--Delicious and Nutritious Desserts. The frosting on the meal-time cake is often packed with calories but low in key nutrients. This lesson helps homemakers select and create attractive and tasty desserts that are in harmony with modern day nutritional needs.

October--Automobile Insurance and Reform. Auto insurance is in a state of change. An evaluation of present insurance and a look at reformation, including the "no fault" concept will be discussed.

November--Veneral Disease. Oregon is one of 10 states with the highest rate of VD in the U. S. This lesson focuses on why the increase in VD, symptoms, treatment and how to reduce incidence.

December--Korea, Culture and Customs.

A fascinating journey to the Orient to learn about their family structure, food habits and social traditions.

February--What's Happening in Oregon Families? Current information on abortion, illegitimacy, adoption, divorce, marriage of the young and elderly, child abuse and other topics which reflect happenings in Oregon families will be discussed.

March--The Family and the Law. This lesson is concerned with choosing and using a lawyer and some of the transactions that families are involved in with legal implications such as signing a contract, accidents, buying real estate, and teenagers and the law.

April--Family's Role in Ecology. Family members share in the responsibility for achieving a high level of livability in Oregon. We will learn about the effect of air, water and noise pollution, packaging and garbage.

May--Adventures in Salad Making. Whether a salad is served as a complete meal or an accompaniment to the main dish, it can be one of the most creative and fun parts of preparing a meal. An enticing salad with taste and eye appeal is also fun for your family and friends to eat.

Special Interest--Food Safety, Correspondence Course. Many people today are concerned about food additives, and natural organic foods. Safe

home canning and foodborne illnesses will also be covered in this four lesson course.

Parents and Toddlers, Correspondence Course. Parents of 1 through 3 year old children are frequently puzzled by their behavior. This course is provided to help parents with care and guidance of the baby who has learned to get around the house on his own two feet.

Auto Mechanics--Workshop. Basic knowledge of how the auto functions, simple maintenance and repairs will be taught.

Building and Remodeling--Seminar. Individual study packets will be provided for those who are building or remodeling a house. Local resource people will answer questions.

Women Vets Benefits Same

Henry G. Helmstetter, acting director of the Veterans Administration regional office in Portland, reminded women veterans today that they are entitled to the same benefits as their male counterparts under the G. I. Bill.

Helmstetter estimated that there are more than 2,000 women from the state of Oregon who have served with the armed forces since the end of the Korean Conflict.

"The new 'bill of rights' equalizes VA benefits for women veterans, allowing them to receive additional G.I. Bill

payment for their husbands and making VA dependents' educational assistance, death pension, and G. I. home loans available to widows of women veterans on the same basis as for widows of men who served in the military," the VA director explained.

Helmstetter added that husbands of women veterans totally and permanently disabled by service-connected conditions are eligible for educational assistance.

Nationwide there are now more than half a million women veterans. They comprise nearly two percent of the nation's total veteran population. More than half served during World War II.

Of the 537,000 total, 16,000 served during the Spanish-American War and World War I; 307,000 during World War II; 74,000 during the Korean Conflict; 57,000 between the Korean Conflict and the beginning of the Vietnam Era on Aug. 5, 1964; and 83,000 during the Vietnam Era.
