Fair theme entries wanted

Suggestions for a theme for the 1974 Curry county fair are being requested by Ron Crook, manager. A \$10 prize will be awarded for the theme chosen. Entries should be short, precise, and adaptable for use in all departments. Entries may be submitted by organizations or individuals and should be mailed in to Box 1072, Gold Beach or given to Crook before the next fair board meeting Jan. 8.

Crook also said that horse manure for fertilizer is available free at the fairgrounds and Dianne Hartwell, caretaker at the fairgrounds, will show anyone where to go for the material.

The former restaurant building on the northeast corner of the grounds was leased to the Curry County Historical society for \$1.00 per year for a museum with the provision that the building be open during the fair.

Doyle F. Quiggle of T&H Construction of Arcata presented rough plans for an arena for the fairgrounds of the type the company builds.

His proposal was for a 150 by 200 ft. clear span building with a 24 ft. by 200 ft. addition for bleachers seating 1400.

Part of such a building could be sectioned off and used for livestock display during the fair and the building would be large enough for motorcycle events and other activities during the off season.

Quiggle said the building could be put up exclusive of the bleachers for "less than \$120,000". The fair has \$40,000 in a capital additions fund.
