Food Facts Are Noted

What are you eating? asks Curry county extension agent, Dora L. Rumsey. Occasionally we all need to pause and review a few facts about the foods we choose and the reasons why a variety of foods build strong, healthy bodies. Foods supply the substances called nutrients needed by the body for growth, repair and energy. There are five basic classes of these nutrients: protein, fats, carbohydrates, vitamins and minerals.

Protein is necessary for tissue formation and energy. Fats and carbohydrates are the primary sources of energy needed for work, for play and just to keep the body functioning. Vitamins and minerals are required for proper development of bones, teeth and blood and for proper usage of the other vital nutrients.

Since your physical well being depends on the quality of the foods you eat, choose carefully. Mrs. Rumsey. No one food will supply all the essential nutrients. Family meals should be planned to include a variety of foods from all the food groups to supply all of the nutrients each day because some nutrients cannot be stored in the body.

The meat group should supply at least two servings and can include fish, poultry, eggs, cheese, dried peas and beans and nuts, in addition to red meat. The dairy group should supply two or more servings of milk or milk equivalents.

The fruit and vegetables, one or more servings of citrus fruits or tomatoes, and one serving of potatoes or other fruits and vegetables. The bread and cereal group should provide four or more servings of enriched or whole grain products.
