COOK BOOK AT LIBRARY

A very interesting book at the Langlois Public Library for the cooking enthusiasts is "The Seasonal Kitchen." A Return to Fresh Foods, by Perla Meyers. This book is about cooking creatively with fresh foods. Based on the author's experiences while teaching, traveling and entertaining, it contains more than 300 internationally inspired recipes that are a mixture of the regional haute cuisine and peasant cooking of Europe from Scandinavia to the Middle East.

The recipes are basic and sensible. They depend on the quality of ingredients rather than on complicated techniques for making elaborate sauces to conceal poor food. Here are new blendings of vegetables, meats and herbs in such exciting, original recipes as Chicken Breasts in Chive Cream, Mussels in Shallot Mayonnaise, Asparagus with Lemon, Chives and Dill, and Beets in Mustard Sauce. All have been developed and tested by the author and her students.

They are followed by Basics, such as stocks, sauces and dressings; Glossary; and comprehensive Index, which features the seasonal uses of ingredients.
