## Blanco Ends First Grid Season Even

Football season ended at Blanco Junior High School and the Eagles finished with a 3-3 record. Although the Eagles only had 14 boys out for ball this season, they worked hard, learned from their mistakes and never gave up. Lack of enough players to ever have a full scrimmage and injuries to key players (Pete Alexander began the season with a broken hand, Bill Belcher missed three games due to a broken finger, Paul Klutz sat out the last four games with a severely cut right arm, and Don Litterell missed the last three games with a bad ankle) plus the fact Blanco had never before played competitive football with other schools made the 3-3 won-lost record even more respectable. Coach Jerry Florence, reflecting on the season, said, "It's amazing how much they have improved . . . when the season began they didn't look very impressive, but we progressed from game to game . . . I wish the season were just now starting instead of ending." Coach Jerry Cox added, "We played some very good teams . . . some were faster, most were bigger, and all had more players . . . our guys hung right in there and were never 'out' of any of the contests . . . I'm very proud of them."

Blanco 8 -- Pacific High J.V. "B" Team 6  
 The first game of the season turned out to be a defensive struggle. Paul Klutz scored in the first quarter for the Eagles after a blocked punt, and Chip Lewis scored the extra point. Mike Schroeder scored on a 25 yard run for the Pirates, but the Eagles prevented the extra point attempt. Dennis Gehrke, Mike Kirkpatrick, Paul Klutz and Dean Miles played outstanding defense.

Blanco 18 -- Bandon 12  
 The last game of the season proved to be the most exciting. Played in the rain and mud, Chip Lewis directed the Eagles to an impressive victory over the Tigers. Strong defensive efforts were given by Dennis Gehrke, Bill Belcher, Dean Miles, Chris Briggs and Mike Kirkpatrick. Offensively, the Eagles depended on Pete Alexander and Brad Kadelbach. Tied 12-12 with four minutes left, Chip Lewis called on Alexander and Kadelbach to carry the ball on alternating carries on a 45 yard drive climaxed by the game-winning touchdown. Dean Miles then recovered a Bandon fumble with two minutes left to insure victory.

The Eagle team was composed of 13 8th graders and one 7th grader which doesn't leave much of a nucleus for next year's team, but large 6th grade classes this year may produce the numbers needed for a successful football program next year. Steve Roberts will be the only player next year with experience, so will probably assume a leadership role. Pacific's J.V. team should be greatly enhanced by the addition of this year's 8th grade squad. Dennis Gehrke, Dean Miles and Mike Kirkpatrick played consistently good all through the season, and Bill Belcher, Chris Briggs, Pete Alexander, Les Anderson and Brad Kadelbach gave indications they will be tough to deal with on defense. Paul Klutz, Pete Alexander, Brad Kadelbach, Chip Lewis, Pat Richards, Kevin Briggs, Don Litterell and Les Anderson have displayed a good offensive show and promise big things in the years to come. The Blanco football team, the coaches, and the school thank those patrons of the community who gave them support throughout the season.

Pacific J.V. "B" Team 14 -- Blanco 6  
 Pacific was able to generate a respectable offense, play good defense, and capitalize on Blanco errors. Blanco's lone score came on an 85 yard pass-run play from Don Litterell to Paul Klutz.

Bandon 14 -- Blanco 0  
 Blanco completely dominated every aspect of the game except the scoring. Two defensive lapses by the Eagles led to two Bandon scores. Pat Richards,

## Nice Weather Rough On Big Game Hunters

Old Man Weather worked against the big game hunter this fall by producing one of the most pleasant autumn periods in years, according to the Oregon Wildlife Commission.

The mule deer season, which opened on drought conditions, ended on much the same note. It was the only eastern Oregon deer season in many years which was neither preceded by precipitation in some form nor hit by snow or rain in late season. Hunting conditions were noisy and warm from beginning to end and the harvest of mule deer is expected to be down considerably from previous years when all the scores are in.

The blacktail deer season, which characteristically opens in western Oregon with plenty of leafy brush for the deer to hide in, usually improves toward season's end. Cold weather and rainstorms with wind normally combine to knock the leaves from deciduous plants and improve the hunter's odds. This year the storms didn't come and, although blacktail deer hunting success did improve in the last week or two of the season when deer began

moving about more freely with onset of the breeding season, the take of blacktail deer will probably also be considerably below usual.

Eastern Oregon elk hunters found tough early season hunting conditions because of the dry weather but rains helped considerably in the later part of the season and higher elevations in some areas even got some snow, a big help to the hunters who stuck it out to the end.

All these seasons are over now and the only major big game season not completed is the western Oregon hunt for Roosevelt elk. Even though Oregon seems to be about a month behind in its weather, prospects look good for Roosevelt elk hunters. Leaf-fall has begun in earnest and there has already been enough rain to dampen the forests.

The Commission's final measure of big game harvest does not come until all the seasons have ended. Then a random sample of hunters is sent a questionnaire from which total harvest and hunter success are determined.
