NOTICE OF HEARING

On Thursday, May 20, 1976, at the hour of 8:00 p.m., a public hearing will be held in the circuit courtroom of the Curry County Courthouse, Gold Beach, Oregon, for amendment of the set-back regulations of the Zoning Ordinance.

The proposed amendment provides for a minimum of ten feet from lot lines bordering existing roads other than an alley, provided that at least a thirty-five foot set-back from the center-line of existing roads is maintained, and a minimum set-back of five feet from all other lot lines in zones A-1, R-1, R-2, R-3, R-A, F-G and F-1.

The proposed amendment also provides for inclusion of the following definition:

Alley: A street which affords only a secondary means of access to property. Written testimony may be submitted by writing to the Curry County Planning Commission, P.O. Big Game Surveys Completed

Fish and Wildlife Department field biologists have completed their spring surveys of big game trends and winter survival. Most biologists are very encouraged by the results of their observations.

The mule deer of eastern Oregon are bouncing back very well in all but a few southeast management units. There was an improved carry-over of bucks as a result of the short, 7-day hunting season and forked horn regulations last fall. On top of that, fawn survival improved because of mild weather and good forage this winter. Good fawn crops are expected this spring because of improved physical condition in mule deer does.

believe since they've had to scratch harder in recent years. But this was due to competition with increasing numbers of hunters rather than low elk numbers.

Biologists are seeing more elk now than ever before. Many ranges have tended to shift in recent years from browse or "leafy" forage to grass ranges, a transition that favors elk, usually at the expense of deer. On northeastern management unit trend routes biologists recorded an average of 11.7 elk per mile. This compares with 10.3 per mile last year and 8.2 per mile for the ten-year average.

Antelope populations are also remaining fairly stable although biologists did note very poor fawn production this year in the Fort Rock-Silver Lake, Juniper, Malheur River, Maury, Ochoco, and Silver Lake units. Antelope fawn production has been gradually declining in recent years and biologists believe climatic factors and predation laws have probably been the major reason as they have for mule deer.

Antelope are on the increase, however, in Baker and Lookout Mountain units. These units are on what used to be the fringe of antelope range and have not, so far, been open to hunting.
