Traffic enforcement has increased with the increased traffic volume. Thirtysix cita-

Some save us \$50 and some save thousands of dollars."
Concerning the physical plant and infrastructure of CCEC, Meader said "We have taken excellent care of the plant. We have completed over \$2 million in tree trimming, which is a huge amount of our budget, but is one that will never go away."
"We have also replaced 245 bad poles and installed 2,000 feet of underground power cable."

Meader also noted the replacement of transformers which had rusted out with "stainless steel" units.
"We have also replaced all software," said Meader. "I'd like to say it's all gone smoothly ... but we will now be able to update every six months for the next 10 years, which means that we will not become antiquated."
Meader had high praise for the staff and CCEC emergency crews. "We have a great group

of employees," he said. "Our job is to give them the tools they need and get out of the way."
Following his remarks the board fielded questions from the public, then adjourned.
Most of those attending seemed pleased with the information they had been given, although there were still those who were critical.
"There are so many issues with the coop," said Ove Bulskov of Gold Beach. "They have a closed door policy – the coop board members are my neighbors and friends, but have a policy of closed meetings."
Among those pleased with the

meeting were Ray Johnson and Norma Anderson of Port Orford. "I live close," said Johnson. "I've been to several of these meetings."
"I had a question to ask f the board members regarding the return of capital credits to a certain organization that had been dissolved – but (I learned that) the capital credits will be forwarded to the Common Good."
For her part Anderson was pleased with what she heard. "The information that Roger, Daryl and Frank gave was very positive and understandable," said Anderson. "They didn't white-wash anything."
