Pair seriously hurt in crash on Hwy. 101

A couple from Grand Rapids, Michigan was seriously injured Saturday afternoon while traveling in Oregon on Highway 101 south of Coos Bay when their vehicle collided with a tree. The Oregon State Police (OSP) investigation indicates the driver may have fallen asleep before crashing into the tree.

According to OSP Senior Trooper Fred Dunlap, on July 11, at approximately 2:09 p.m. a 2009 Mazda "5" minivan driven by Shirley Ann Campbell, age 74, was northbound on Highway 101 at milepost 246 when the vehicle traveled off the right side of the highway, down an embankment and crashed head-on into a tree.

Shirley Campbell and her passenger, Bernad D. Campbell, age 77, were seriously injured and had to be extricated from the van by Millington Fire District and Green Acres Fire District emergency personnel. They were using safety restraints and the vehicle's airbags deployed.

Bay Cities Ambulance transported both to Bay Area Hospital in Coos Bay. Following initial treatment both were then transported by air ambulance to Legacy Emanuel Hospital in Portland for further treatment. They are reportedly in stable condition.

OSP troopers from the Coos Bay Area Command office were assisted at the scene by Coos County Sheriff's Office and ODOT.
