Are you swatting the fly? Have you seen any flies to swat? If not, be on guard and massacre the first one that shows himself.

Scientists tell us that every fly we kill now means that there will be millions less to kill later in the season. And others who were paid by commissions to pay attention to the war waged upon this pest last year are firm in their belief that the nation is on the right track to exterminate the little nuisance. Last year was really the first of any determined effort. Housewives all over the United States took arms against it as a common foe and the result was that many communities reported even a distinctly visible decrease in the number of flies throughout the summer and in some instances the report stated that the extermination was almost complete.

Think of thirty million women and as many children swatting a dozen flies a day! It is plainly seen that the war can be won. All that is needed is determined effort in every home.

The swatter need not be the only instrument used. Aided by the use of fly paper or traps the work will go forward much more rapidly. It's a cause worth of your co-operation. At first the idea of exterminating the pest by killing them individually was ridiculed but a season's effort has proven that it is not impossible and the coming summer will give even more proof. But all must help.

Do your swatting early.

POULTRY PICKINGS.

Wait not less than three weeks after the birds have been mated before you take out any eggs for hatching.

While young turkeys are very tender and much harder to raise to maturity than young chickens, yet after a month old the danger line is past, and they become harder than any chick.

A warm sheltered nest adds much to the chances of the early sinner hatching well.

Never sell your best turkeys. Keep them for breeding.

Young turkeys are very apt to be overfed and thus falling prey to indigestion.

Often little chicks are hatched with some disease. Incubator trays should be washed with hot water to which has been added a tablespoonful of good disinfectant to a gallon of water.

QUALITIES OF THE VARIOUS HEN BREEDS

Practically all egg breeds are small to medium in size, active and of a nervous disposition, writes a correspondent of the National Stockman.

They mature early and feather quickly, sometimes even beginning to lay at the age of four to five months. As a class they are poor sitters and mothers, commonly known as nonsitters. They are great foragers, being able to pick up a large part of their maintenance on a farm. They have a large headgear (comb and wattles), are closely feathered and more susceptible to cold than some of our heavier breeds. All lay white eggs.

The meat breeds are large, heavy, slow, inactive, loosely feathered, good mothers, have small combs and wattles, lay brown eggs and are rather slow in maturing and feathering. The mature stock is very hardy, yet the chicks are slow in feathering and sometimes hard to raise on account of this. They stand confinement well with proper care. They are noted for the quality and quantity of their meat.

Some breeds, as the Plymouth Rocks, Wyandottes, Reds and Orpingtons, are considered as general purpose breeds. They have medium sized headgear and are more loosely feathered than the egg breeds; hence they can stand cold better. They are excellent winter lay-

ers, but are not considered as economical layers as the egg breeds, but better layers than the meat breeds. Two fowls of the general purpose breeds eat as much as three of the egg breeds.

They can be kept profitably as egg producers and meat producers, hence have been named general purpose breeds or dual purpose breeds. They are of a more gentle and quiet disposition than the egg breeds. Being larger and having smaller wings than the egg breeds, they cannot make as long flights or fly over high inclosures. They do well in confinement and make the best mothers, neither being too clumsy nor too nervous.

Some of the breeds in this class are rather persistent sitters. They are of a blocky appearance, with a compact body set on rather short but strong legs, which are free from feathers. They lay medium sized brown eggs. They are good foragers, hardy and easy to raise. In most all characteristics they are about halfway between the egg and meat breeds. The majority of the general purpose breeds have yellow skin and shanks, but a few have white skin and shanks.
