less investment than lumbering.

This firm makes a A No. 1 shingle and lately received a communication from a lumber firm in Wisconsin wanting to engage their entire output for a series of years and requesting them to put in an enlarged outfit so they could manufacture on a larger scale. As long as they have such an extensive local demand they are content.

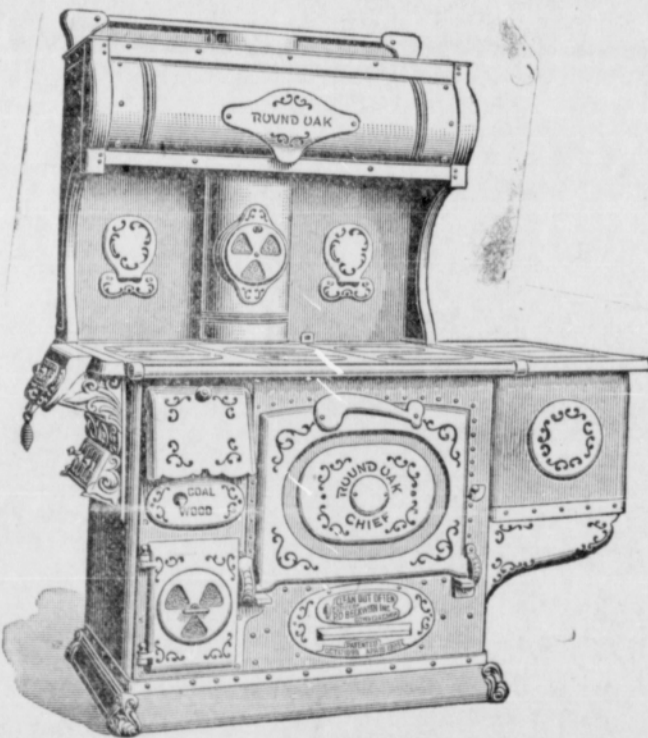
