GOOD ROADS RETURNS.

Good roads mean better schools and a higher moral and educational standard; they bring the best instead of the worst out of people. Bad roads make one feel as though he did not care how he dressed or how he appeared. Wherever good roads are built the people begin to buy paint; the house and the barns are treated; the picket fence displaces the tumble down one in front; rose bushes are planted and the lawn has attention; all these things come along apace.

Hence good road building should not be regarded as an expense, but as an investment. They will pay a larger and surer return than money invested in almost any other direction. A high authority has said that with good roads the farmer can take advantage of the market; with bad roads the market nearly always takes advantage of the farmer.—Farm Progress.

GOOD ROADS AND SCHOOLS.

How Better Highways Would Aid Country Education.

That improved roads would benefit our country school system, there would seem to be no doubt. Improved roads make it possible to consolidate or centralize the schools and to establish graded schools in the rural districts. Such schools centrally located will accommodate all the children within a radius of from four to five miles. In many communities having the advantage of improved roads commodious buildings have been provided, more competent teachers have been employed and modern facilities for teaching have been supplied at a minimum cost. For instance, since the improvement of the main highways in Durham county, North Carolina, the number of schoolhouses has been reduced from sixty-five to forty-two, of which seventeen are graded and have two or more rooms, and employ two or more teachers.

There are at the present time about 2,000 consolidated rural schools in the United States. It appears that Massachusetts, Ohio and Indiana have made the greatest progress along these lines, and it is rather significant to note that in these states about one-third of the roads have been improved. According to statistics of the agricultural department, there was expended in 1899, \$22,116 in Massachusetts for the conveyance of pupils to consolidated schools, but in 1908 the expenditure for this purpose amounted to \$292,213. In Indiana the expenditure for this purpose in 1904 amounted to \$80,000, while in 1908 \$290,000 was expended. This expenditure for transportation reflects, in a general way, the extent and progress of this new educational movement. It must not be understood that this is an additional burden, as the expenditure thus made is saved in other directions—that is, by the decrease in the number of schools and economy in their operation.—Lexington Herald.

KEEP THE OLD COWS.

Good Dairy Animals Valuable For the Calves They Produce.

There is a tremendous loss to the dairy industry in this state as in other states, we think, because of the sale of eight or nine year old cows, says the Kansas Farmer. These are sold because they are considered as having arrived at an age when they are no longer useful in the dairy. A ten or twelve year old cow which has not been overfed should be a profitable producer of milk if she has ever been profitable.

It is to be recalled that Maid Henry, the famous Holstein of the Kansas Agricultural college, established a world's record in her thirteenth year. Cows of good breeding at this age are worth keeping for their offspring even though they are not profitable producers of milk.

The old cow is frequently sold at a low price and at a real sacrifice. The owner will the next day pay two or three times as much money for a younger cow of no better breeding. To make an exchange of this sort is foolhardy. A cow of good breeding and a liberal producer is worth keeping as long as she can eat well. After she passes this age, when it becomes necessary to sell her, she will bring as much money without teeth as with them, because she goes to the cannery
