CARELESS SUPERVISION.

The American people are losing \$50,000,000 annually because of careless supervision of the 2,300,000 miles of public roads in this country.

Our annual expenditure for roads is \$200,000,000, and it is estimated by experts that one-quarter of it is lost annually because of careless supervision. Some wall of protection must be rebuilt against political meddlers.

The most effective measure of safeguarding the state highway department from the destroying influences of politics is to place it under the general control of a commission. This commission should be nonpartisan, nonpaid, constituted partly by appointment and partly ex officio, on which would be represented the educational and scientific institutions of the states, the appointive members alone being laymen. These men could be trusted to select the chief technical officials without prejudice and with due regard for their qualifications.—Logan Waller Page.

POULTRY GOSSIP.

The lousy hen is the one that always catches cold and finally comes down with the roup. Hens will produce nearly twice as many eggs if fed upon milk than if otherwise fed.

January is the month in which most poultrymen mate up their flocks for the coming breeding season.

During cold weather the eggs should be gathered several times a day, as they very readily chill and crack. Eggs for hatching should be kept in a temperature of not less than 50 degrees.

Separate all the ailing birds from the well ones, keeping the former in warm and dry quarters while undergoing treatment. Increase the quantity of corn in the night ration, especially during very cold weather.
