Word was received by County Treasurer M. E. Dunn that his son Emmer, who has been working in the Union Basin Mining company of Golconda, Arizona, was seriously injured when a large gasoline tank exploded. The cause of the accident is unknown as Mr. Dunn has not yet learned the details.

Mr. Dunn is well known here, having lived here for some time. He has been working for the Basin company for the past several years as a mechanic.

The proposed which the United States Forestry Service is to build around the base of Mt. Hood, connecting the Hood River valley and the Barlow road, is beginning to take form. It is planned by the forestry department to place two crews in the field next week to make the survey of the route and estimate of the cost of construction. It will take about three months to make the survey.

The road will be approximately 20 miles in length. Starting from Mt. Hood Lodge, the road will loop the eastern side of the mountain, coming into the Barlow road a few miles east of Government Camp.

It is thought that grade not to exceed 4 per cent can be obtained.

In its construction it is the aim to build on the same high standard as the Columbia river highway into which it will link.

The contract for the reconstruction of the county bridge across the Sandy river near Bull Run was awarded to Ed Olds, of Oak Grove, by the county court Friday for \$2190. Four bids were received for the work, the offers ranging as high as \$3400.
