ORDINANCE

An ordinance for the purpose of levying a tax of five mills on all taxable property, both real and personal within the City of Sandy.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY OF SANDY:

Section 1; That the Common Council of the City of Sandy does hereby levy a tax of five (5) mills on all the taxable property, real and personal, which is taxable for state and county purposes, within the corporate limits of the City of Sandy, to be collected as other taxes are collected in the State of Oregon, by the Treasurer and Tax Collector of Clackamas County, Oregon, during the year 1915, with the taxes commonly known as the taxes of 1914.

Read for the first time and ordered posted at a regular adjourned meeting of the Common Council of the City of Sandy, held on the 18th day of October, A. D. 1915, and to come up for final passage at a regular meeting of the said council to be held on the 1st day of November, 1915, at 7:30 o'clock, p. m., at the City Hall.

| This budget of the City of Sandy, includes nothing, except \$85.00 for the improvement of roads and streets, and part of this sum is for cross walks. Money for roads and streets, if any money is raised for that purpose, must come from the County Road Tax, if the voters of the County levy a road tax, or from a special road tax levied by Sandy as a road district of Clackamas County. If there are no unpaid taxes January 1, 1916, Sandy will have received \$293.76 of road tax from the County levy, during 1915.
