Notice for Levy of Additional Road Tax

Notice is hereby given that we, the
undersigned Tax Payers, consisting of
ten per cent. of the Tax Payers in Road
District No. 35, Clackamas County, Ore-
gon, hereby give notice to the Tax Pay-
ers of said Road District No. 35 that there
will be a meeting of the Tax Payers of
said District in the School house at
Cottrell, Oregon, on the 27th day of No-
vember, 1915 at 2 o'clock p. m., to vote
an additional tax in said District for
road purposes, as provided by an act of
the legislature in 1913, Section 6321,
Page 24, of the Road Laws of Oregon,
and which Act provides as follows, to-
wit:

6321. Note of Additional Tax by Tax-
Payers—Proceedings For.

The resident taxpayers of any road
district in any county of this State may
vote an additional tax for road purposes;
provided, at least 10 per cent. of the tax
payers of said district shall give notice,
which notices shall be posted by the
road supervisor of such district by post-
ing such notices in three public places in
such district and one in the court house
of the county in which said district lies,
at least 10 days prior to the meeting
hereinafter provided and publish one
notice at least three weeks in one weekly
newspaper of general circulation in said
county, which notices shall be signed by
at least 10 per cent. of the tax payers of
said road district, and shall give the
time, place and object of said meeting,
which meeting shall be held in the
month of November; proof of posting
notice of said meeting shall be made by
affidavit of the road supervisor and sub-
mitted to such meeting together with
proof of publication of such notice, and
at the time of said meeting it shall be
organized by the election of a chairman
and secretary, and at such meeting they
may by a majority vote of such tax pay-
ers, levy such additional tax as they
may deem advisable to improve the roads
of said district, and if a tax be levied, it
shall be the duty of said chairman and
secretary to certify to the county clerk of
such county, prior to December 1st, the
levy so made by the tax payers of said
district, and the county clerk shall com-
pute and extend said levy on the assess-
ment roll for that year, the same as
other taxes are extended, and it shall be
the duty of the tax collector to proceed to
collect said taxes in money, the same as
other taxes are collected by him, and
shall be credited and kept by the treas-
urer to the account of the road district
making such levy; provided that the
secretary of said meeting shall keep a
record of all proceedings and due proof
of posting and publishing of said notices
and shall enclose with his certificate
above mentioned to the county clerk of
such county, certified copies of all pro-
ceedings, including such proof of posting
notices and publication thereof.

Notice for Levy of Additional Road Tax

Notice is hereby given that we, the
undersigned Tax Payers, consisting of
ten per cent. of the Tax Payers in Road
District No. 48, Clackamas County, Ore-
gon, hereby give notice to the Tax Pay-
ers of said Road District No. 48 that
there will be a meeting of the Tax Pay-
ers of said District in the School House,
at Firwood, Oregon, on the 27th day of
November, 1915 at two (2) o'clock p. m.
to vote an additional tax in said District
for road purposes, as provided by an act
of the legislature in 1913, Section 6321,
Page 24, of the Road Laws of Oregon,
and which Act provides as follows, to-
wit:

6321. Note of Additional Tax by Tax-
payers—Proceedings For.

The resident taxpayers of any road
district in any county of this State may
vote an additional tax for road purposes;
provided, at least 10 per cent. of the tax
payers of said district shall give notice,
which notices shall be posted by the
road supervisor of such district by post-
ing such notices in three public places
in such district and one in the court
house of the county in which said dis-

trict lies, at least 10 days prior to the
meeting hereinafter provided, and pub-
lish one notice at least three weeks in
one weekly newspaper of general circula-
tion in said county, which notices shall
be signed by at least 10 per cent. of the
tax payers of said road district, and shall
give the time, place and object of said
meeting, which meeting shall be held in
the month of November; proof of post-
ing notice of said meeting shall be made
by affidavit of the road supervisor and
submitted to such meeting together with
proof of publication of such notice, and
at the time of said meeting it shall be
organized by the election of a chairman
and secretary, and at such meeting they
may by a majority vote of such tax pay-
ers, levy such additional tax as they may
deem advisable to improve the roads of
said district, and if a tax be levied, it
shall be the duty of said chairman and
secretary to certify to the county clerk
of such county, prior to December 1st,
the levy so made by the tax payers of
said district, and the county clerk shall
compute and extend such levy on the as-
sessment roll for that year, the same as
other taxes are extended, and it shall be
the duty of the tax collector to proceed
to collect said taxes in money, the same
as other taxes are collected, and turn
the same over to the county treasurer
in the same manner and at the same time
he pays over other taxes collected by
him, and shall be credited and kept by
the treasurer to the account of the road
district making such levy; provided that
the secretary of said meeting shall keep
a record of all proceedings and due proof
of posting and publishing of said notices,
and shall enclose with his certificate
above mentioned, to the county clerk of
such county, certified copies of all pro-
ceedings, including such proof of post-
ing notices and publication thereof.
