ANNUAL MEETING OF MT. HOOD CREAMERY

The second annual meeting of the Mt. Hood Creamery Company was held in I. O. O. F. hall Saturday, January 15th. The attendance was small on account of the cold weather. It was hoped that a large number of patrons and dairymen would be present to hear the secretary's reports and interesting talks.

The two retiring directors, Anton Malar, Jr. and H. Widmer, were re-elected for three year terms.

In the afternoon, B. E. Sykes, the butter-maker, gave us an interesting talk on the care of cream. He said that if all patrons sending cream to the plant would keep their stables clean, feed all kale and root crops after milking and cool each skimming of cream before mixing, the butter would bring an average of 2 cents per pound more and this in turn would be paid the patrons.

A vote of thanks was given the directors and butter-maker for the faithful work done the past year.

The creamery is starting the new year with bright prospects. For the benefit of the surrounding community the directors would like to have every patron take better care of cream and also urge all who live in this neighborhood to ship their cream to the local plant.
