Pruning Rose Bushes.

Climbing roses should not be pruned at this time except for the removal of surplus or interfering branches. Every bit of wood removed now reduces the amount of bloom the plant will bear during the coming season. Roses used in border planting should be treated in exactly the same way as other shrubs, except that many of these species will be improved by having all their old wood cut away once in every five or six years. This would mean cutting all the old canes off within three or four inches of ground and forcing the bush to throw up entirely new wood.

Roses used for cut flowers, like the hybrid perpetuals, the hybrid teas, and teas, should be severely pruned. The hybrid perpetuals may be cut as soon as freezing weather is past. Pruning of the hybrid teas and teas, however, should be left until the young growth has started. In both cases the plant should be cut to within 6 inches or one foot of the ground. Four or six eyes to a stem is about the proper amount of wood to leave.

STUDY YOUR SOIL.

Farmers Should Learn the Nature of the Foundation of Their Farms.

No doubt the farmers of today would be more successful if they would carefully study the nature of the soil of their farms, finding out what elements they lack and going to work to supply that deficiency, writes W. D. Neale in the Farm Progress.

It may not be necessary for the farmer to have a knowledge of chemistry in order to make a chemical analysis of his soil to determine its elements. If he has an observing eye he can soon discover by growth of the crops and the color of the soil what it contains and what it lacks. After all it is not so much what elements the soil contains, but how much of nitrogen, phosphorus and potassium is available for plant food.

For instance, nitrogen produces the growth of leaf and branch and stalk. If the soil is rich in nitrogen the leaf will have the heavy dark color, and if the element exists in too great a proportion the growth will be rank and grain will be light. This is especially noticeable when wheat, oats or corn is grown where an old straw rick once stood.

Phosphorus aids in the formation of pollen and brings seed to a perfect maturity. If this acid is lacking the plant will sometimes die before maturing seed. Potassium supplies the starch in the grain, and when this is wanting there will be no plumpness, but a shriveled condition of the grain.

The color of the soil also reveals its nature. If the soil is dark there is a great deal of organic matter in it. Organic matter in abundance means plenty of nitrogen. Clay and light colored soils denote the lack of nitrogen. There may be some exceptions, but not many.

The texture of the soil also indicates its properties. Organic matter in abundance makes the soil porous. Mellow soils contain plenty of phosphorus. If soils pack hard after rains it is the evidence of lack of nitrogen and phosphorus.

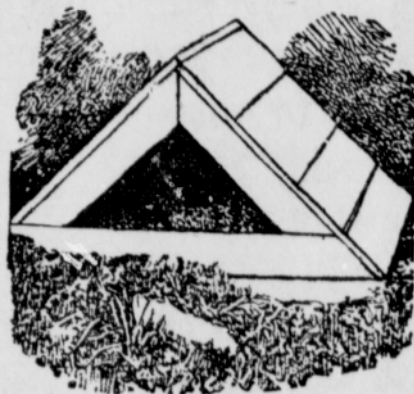

KEEPING CABBAGES.

Can Be Stored For Winter Use in a Barrel Out of Doors.

When the cellar is too warm and you must devise a plan to keep a few cabbages for family use try putting them in a barrel out of doors, says a contributor to the Iowa Homestead. Put a headless barrel into the ground, leaving the top slightly above the surface, and put in the close trimmed heads. Leave room enough at the top to put in a little clean straw or hay—or papers—and spread an oilcloth over it or some boards to keep the rain out.

It does not harm even if the cabbage freeze, and you can open your cache any time in winter and take out a head.

But one may say: "Oh, that's no good. I've tried it and they all rotted." The answer to that is, "You may have tried it, but you didn't do your work carefully." Failure will follow shiftless disregard of rules.

In following any such plan use a little good horse sense. You must plan to keep water out of the barrel, so let it be tight enough to keep out seepage. Then so fill up and level the surface that the drainage will be away from

the barrel. Another point is that the cabbage must be carefully trimmed, removing every broken or decaying leaf and putting in only sound, smooth heads. If you put in any rubbish you not only invite decay, you make it certain.

It is well to put a few sticks in the bottom to leave an air space. And do not try to see how closely you can pack them, but rather lay them in loosely and so place them that there will be air spaces all through.

If you aim to keep the frost out it will require considerable covering, and if you do that you will be likely to make your cache too warm and that will induce rot. The best way is to plan to keep the cabbage close to the freezing point and far better have it frozen than too warm. But if it freezes it must be kept frozen, for it will never do to have it freezing and thawing out a half dozen times during the winter.

After the cabbage is in and you have filled up the top of the barrel with a little clean straw or hay, rounding it up in the center, then put over a piece of oilcloth or heavy canvas. This is to turn off the water. Have it large enough so that all of the dripping will be outside the barrel. Then turn a square box over it and it is done. The box should be just big enough to hold the cloth in place.
