SUMMONS

To Archibald Howard and Bessie Howard, Defendants:

IN THE NAME OF THE STATE OF OREGON: You are hereby required to appear and answer the complaint filed against you and each of you, in the above entitled action on or before the 8th day of April, A. D. 1916, and if you fail to answer or appear, for want thereof the plaintiff will apply to the court for the relief demanded in the complaint, to-wit:

For a judgement in the sum of \$750.00, with interest at the rate of 8 per cent per annum from October 10, 1914, until paid; for the further sum of \$75.00 attorney's fees and for his costs and disbursements herein, and that execution issue therefore. That the usual decree may be made for the sale of the property described in plaintiff's complaint, by the sheriff of said County, according to law, and the practice of this court. That the proceeds of said sale may be applied to the payment of the amount due plaintiff. That said defendants and all person claiming under them, subsequent to the execution of said mortgage upon the said premises, either as purchasers or encumbrancers, or otherwise, may be barred and foreclosed of all rights, claims or equity of redemption in the said premises and every part thereof.

That the plaintiff or any other party to this suit may become a purchaser at said sale, that the sheriff shall execute a deed to the purchaser; that the purchaser be let into the possession of the said premises upon production of the sheriff's certificate of sale therefor, and that the plaintiff may have such other and further relief in the premises, as to the court, may seem meet and agreeable to equity. This summons is published by virtue of an order made by J. U. Campbell, Judge of the above entitled court, on the 24th day of February, A. D. 1916, directing that same be published in the Sandy News, a newspaper of general circulation, published at Sandy in Clackamas County Oregon.
