"I do," the other answered hotly, "and with my own hands too."

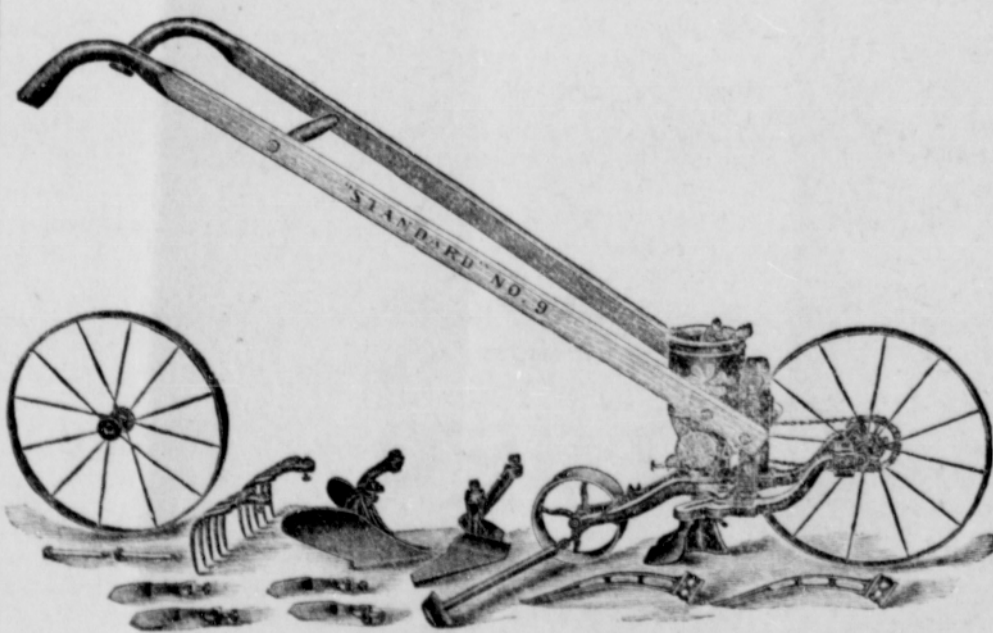
"And what do you pay your hands?" the etcher inquired. "I'm thinking of starting an art factory myself."
