Notice is hereby given to the legal voters of School District No. 46 of Clackamas County, State of Oregon, that a School Meeting of said District will be held at School House on the 18th day of June, 1916, at 2 o'clock in the afternoon to vote on the proposition of levying a special district tax.

The total amount of money needed by the district during the fiscal year beginning on June 18th, 1916, and ending on June 18th, 1917, is estimated in the following budget and includes the amounts to be received from the county school fund, special district tax, and all other moneys of the district:
