D., 1916, and if you fail to answer or appear for want thereof, plaintiff will apply to the court for the relief demanded in the complaint, to-wit:

For a judgement in the sum of \$750.00 with interest at the rate of 8 per cent per annum from October 10, 1914, until paid; for the further sum of \$75.00 attorney's fees and for his costs and disbursements herein, and that execution issue therefore. That the usual decree may be made for the sale of the property described in plaintiff's complaint, by the sheriff of said County, according to law, and the practice of this court. That the proceeds of said sale may be applied to the payment of the amount due plaintiff; that said defendants and all persons claiming under them, subsequent to the execution of said mortgage upon the said premises, either as purchasers or encumbrancers, or otherwise may be barred and foreclosed of all rights, claims or equity of redemption in the said premises and every part thereof, to-wit: South half of Southeast quarter, Section 26, T. 2 S.
