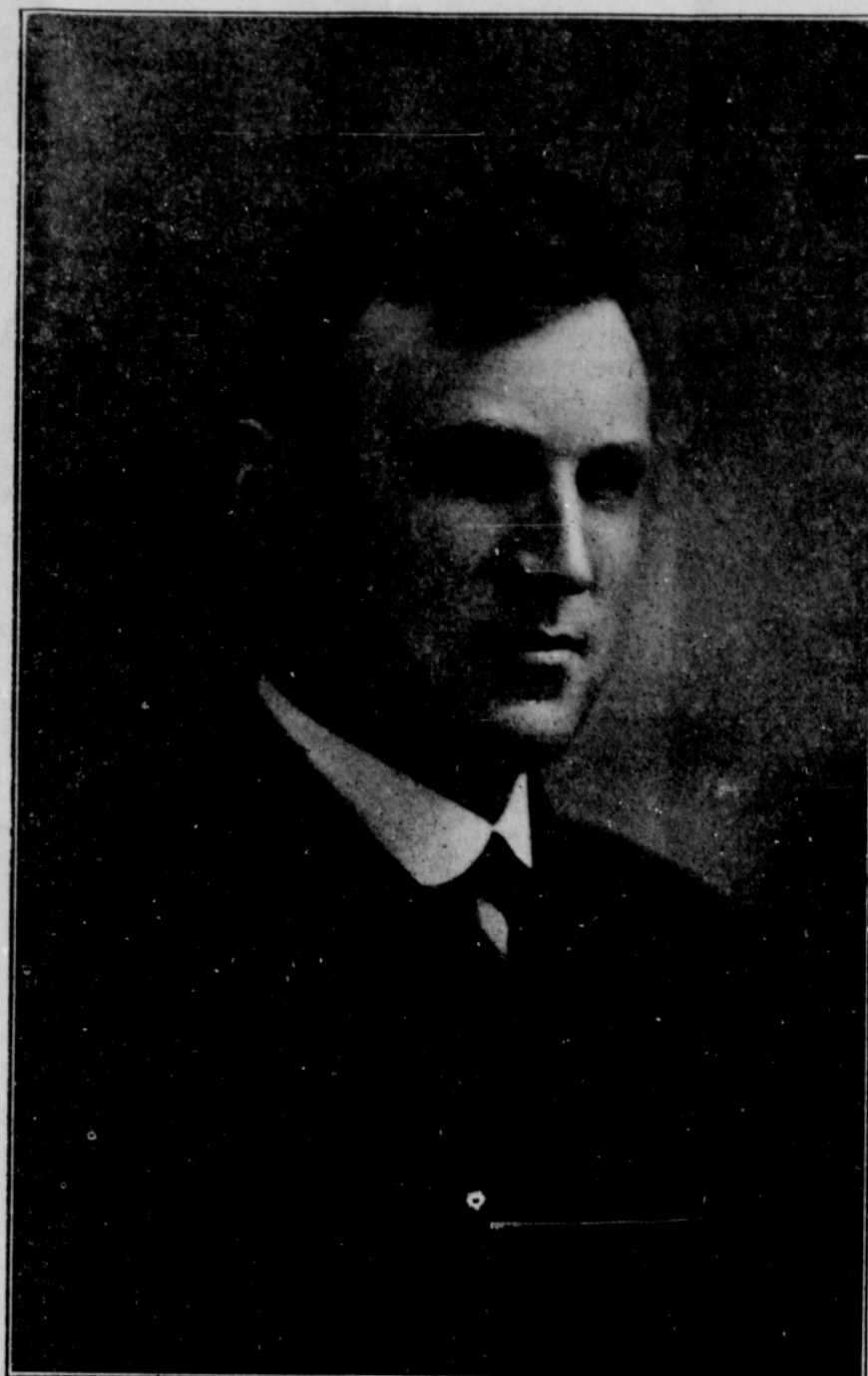

LIVE STOCK AND DAIRY.

Raising the helper calves is one of the dairy farmer's most important tasks.

Overfeeding the calf is just as dangerous a practice as underfeeding.

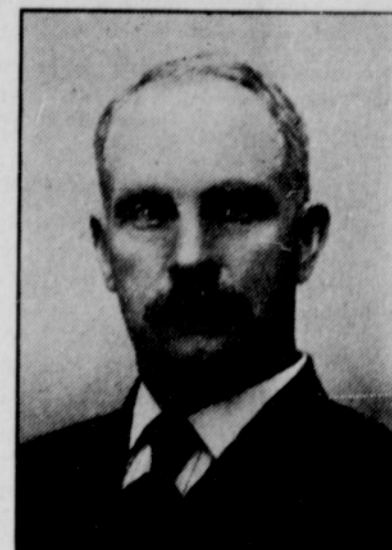
The separator should have a firm, solid foundation that will prevent any danger of vibration when the machine is being used.

The silo is an important factor in tiding over the dry pasture season.

Don't try to winter fall pigs without good provision for slop. Besides the feeding value, the slop encourages the pigs to drink freely, which is desirable in cold weather.

Keep the sows and pigs away from fattening hogs and give them the feeds that produce flesh and bone rather than fat. Shorts are more economical feed for sows and growing pigs than corn.

Salt is added to curd mainly to flavor the cheese. In addition, however, it aids in removing the whey, hardens and contracts the curd, checks the formation of lactic acid and also checks undesirable forms of ferment. Unsalted cheese cures more rapidly, but is apt to develop a bitter flavor.
