FALL PLOWING.

Ground well plowed in the fall will hold moisture better. Freezing will unlock some of the stored plant food, and the plot is ready to be worked the first warm days of early spring. There are some gardens that should not be plowed in the fall because of the tendency of the soil to blow. Blowing is less likely to occur in ground left rough, but such soils may well have a good, heavy mulch of coarse manure and the coarse parts raked off before the garden is planted in the spring. Fall plowing also is helpful in clearing up an ugly back door landscape.—Kansas Station.
