### Bill Is Tax Dodgers' Hope

When the voter gets into the booth  
in November and begins voting on the  
initiative measures let him remember  
what one remarkable measure will do.  
It is called the "Full Rental Value  
Land Tax and Homemakers' Loan  
Fund Amendment" on the ballot, al-  
though its petitions were circulated  
under another name.

If adopted, every other form of prop-  
erty will be exempt from taxation and  
land alone will bear the burden. Rail-  
roads and public service corporations  
will no longer pay their share of the  
taxes. The small man must pay their  
share as well as his own.

Also, after paying taxes to support  
all governmental expenses, the land  
owner must pay a tax so that "loans"  
as high as \$1500 may be made to per-  
sons who have never saved anything for  
themselves. These loans are without  
interest and with questionable security.

Unless this measure is swamped un-  
der a flood of "No" votes, farm land  
and town real estate values will drop  
out of sight before their unfortunate  
owners can catch their breath.

Portland, Ore.—Professor R. C.  
French, ex-President of the State Nor-  
mal School at Weston, Oregon, prefers  
Pendleton to Weston as the facilities

Oregon Normal School. Here is what  
he says:

"The previous history of the Normal  
School in Eastern Oregon proves that  
a large number of young people to  
whom other educational institutions

avail themselves of the privileges of-  
fered by a Normal School to fit them-  
selves for community service in public  
school work. The immediate estab-  
lishment of such a school at some cen-  
tral point, such as Pendleton, would  
prove a great asset to the State of  
Oregon."

able conditions, alfalfa is bringing  
good fortune to thousands of those  
who know it best and who in their  
dealings with it use a fair intelligence.

middle Asia depended upon alfalfa as  
a forage.

Alfalfa is a glutton for lime.

In former times, when a farmer and  
a mortgage got on a Kansas farm the  
man too often was the one who had to  
leave, but since alfalfa came it's the  
mortgage that has to get off.

It was but little more than two de-  
cades ago that Kansas City, incred-  
ulous and in wonder, saw its first car-  
load of alfalfa hay. Last year 12,131  
cars were received and distributed  
there.—Farm Life.
