ORDINANCE.

An ordinance for the purpose of levying a tax of five mills on all taxable property, both real and personal within the City of Sandy.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COMMON COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF SANDY:

Section I: That the Common Council of the City of Sandy does hereby levy a tax of five (5) mills on all the taxable property, real and personal which is taxable for State and County purposes, within the corporate limits of the City of Sandy, to be collected as other taxes are collected in the State of Oregon, by the treasurer and tax collector of Clackamas County, Oregon, during the year 1917 with the taxes commonly known as the taxes of 1916.

Read for the first time and ordered posted at a regular adjourned meeting of the Common Council of the City of Sandy, held on the 9th day of October, A. D., 1916, and to come up for final passage at a regular meeting of the said Council to be held on the 6th day of November 1916 at eight o'clock, p. m. at the City Hall.

A. Goger and Elmer VanFleet were business visitors in Portland Friday.

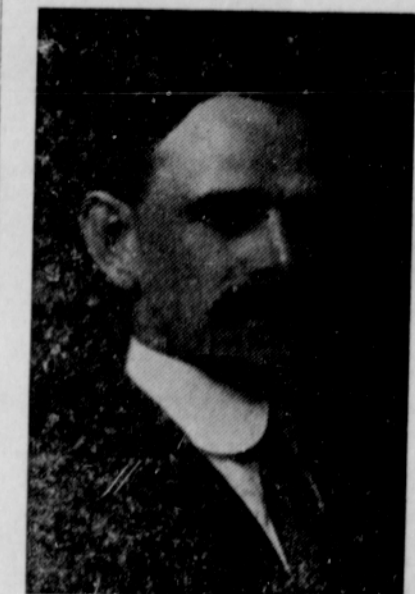
