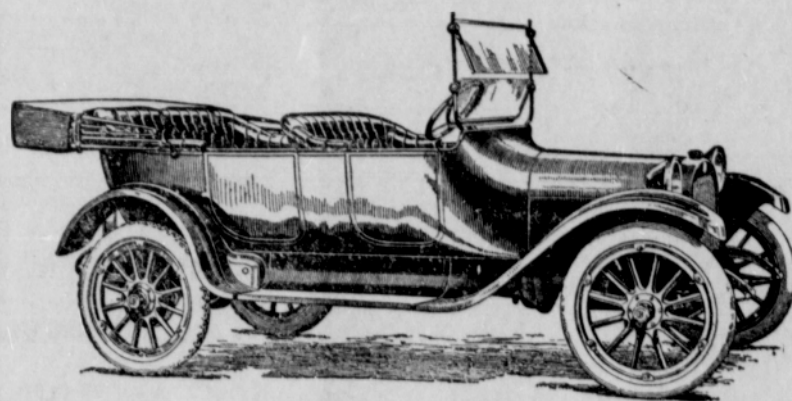
Class superiority and individual claims to superiority bob up in the most unexpected places. People of such limited
