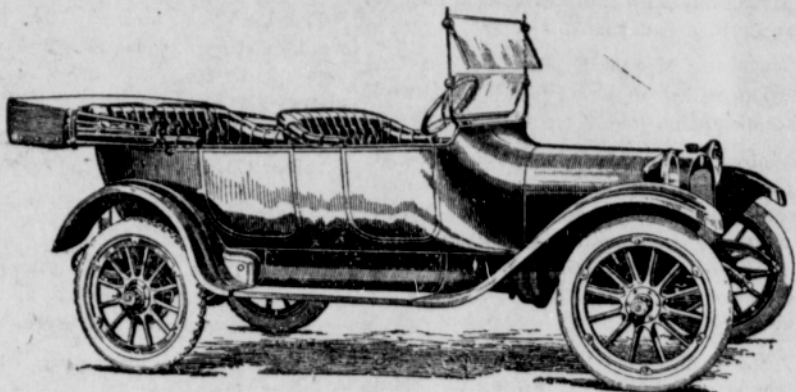

ORDINANCE.

An Ordinance making it unlawful to disturb the peace and quiet of Sandy, providing a speed limit for vehicles, to prevent the obstruction of public ways and streets and to prevent the carrying of concealed weapons, or to resist an officer of Sandy in the performance of his duties and providing a penalty for the violation of this ordinance, and repealing Ordinance No. 10 of the City of Sandy.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COMMON COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF SANDY:

Section 1. It shall be unlawful for any person or persons to disturb the peace, quiet or good order of the City of Sandy by any violent, riotous or disorderly conduct or by the use of any profane, abusive, indecent or obscene language, on any street, highway or public place, and or within the corporate limits of the City of Sandy.

Section 2. That it shall be unlawful for any person or persons to drive or cause to be driven any vehicle, automobile, motor, motor cycle or steam, car or machine, upon the streets, highways or public places of the City of Sandy at a greater speed than fifteen miles per hour.

Section 3. That it shall be unlawful for any person, persons or corporations to obstruct any street, alley, highway, sidewalk or public place within the corporate limits of the City of Sandy.

Section 4. That it shall be unlawful for any person to carry any concealed weapon, revolver, firearm, knife with blade more than five inches long, dirk, dagger, slug shot, metal knuckles or any other instrument by which injury could be inflicted upon the person of another, within the corporate limits of the City of Sandy.

Section 5. It shall be unlawful for any person or persons to abuse, attack, resist any officer of the City of Sandy or to prevent such officer, while such peace officer, marshal or policeman is engaged in the discharge of his official duties of such officer.

Section 6. That any person, parties or corporations found guilty of violating any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and shall be punished by a fine of not less than five dollars or more than fifty dollars or by imprisonment not to exceed thirty days or by both fine and imprisonment.

Section 7. Ordinance No. Ten of the City of Sandy is hereby repealed.

Section VIII of an Ordinance entitled, "An Ordinance governing the running at large of animals within the City of Sandy and regulating the impounding, sale and redemption of the same and providing a penalty for the violation of said ordinance and repealing ordinance No. 19, entitled, "An ordinance prohibiting the running at large of stock including horses, cattle, hogs, sheep, etc., within the corporate limits of the City of Sandy," by repealing Section VII and substitution therefore the following:

FOR WOMEN MOTORISTS.

Some Things a Good Driver Should and Should Not Do.

The good driver of a motorcar never applies brakes swiftly except in an emergency. When drawing up at a street side she cuts off ignition early and allows momentum to carry the car to the stopping place, using the service brake gradually. The good driver thus saves gasoline and wear upon brakes, coasting to a stop with the smoothness of operation of an easy start.

A good driver never uses the emergency brake, because she never has emergencies. She sees and avoids the emergency before it arrives. The poor driver rushes into trouble and depends upon quickness in grabbing the emergency lever to save life. More than one accident has followed a futile attempt to find the seldom used emergency lever in a hurry.

The good driver rounds sharp corners to the right and goes over extremely rough stretches of road or hits unexpected "thank you ma'ams" with clutch disengaged, to save the rear axle mechanism.

The good driver uses the wheel with the least possible motion. She does not drag it suddenly from side to side, but turns it so gradually that passengers are unconscious of the fact. In rounding a corner she commences to straighten the car up before it is half-way around. — Woman's Home Companion.

Section 2. That the following shall be known as Section VIII of the above entitled ordinance, and shall be a part thereof:

"Section VII. The fees for feeding animals shall not exceed one dollar per day for horses, fifty cents per day for mules and cattle, ten cents per day for other animals. That the poundmaster, the Marshall, Chief of Police of Sandy shall be entitled as a fee for impounding, registering and taking up and posting notices: for horses, mules or cattle fifty cents, for other animals twenty-five cents. That said officer shall further be entitled to and shall receive 10 per cent of the proceeds of any sale of such animals. All fees mentioned herein shall be paid by the owner of said animals, or from the funds received on the sale of said animal and not otherwise.
