### Educate Home Farmers.

It is coming to be recognized as a most obvious fact that if we as a people are to again put our country on an equitable living basis we must educate more farmers. Not educate more farmer boys for professions, but educate more BOYS for FARMERS.

From the infancy of the public school up to within the last decade the entire trend of education has been away from the farm and toward the professions. Even the manual training schools have tended to swell the ranks of the mechanical trades at the expense of the farm.

No nation can achieve permanent prosperity without a great and prosperous farming class. When the farm decays the nation deteriorates. Our farms are the very life and heart of our country.

Some, though, may ask how we are to educate more farmers.

Very simple. Make every free school in the land primarily an agricultural school, and a literary school as a secondary matter. Better letters is not the crowning necessity of existence. Bread and meat are. Educate the youth of the land first toward that which is most vitally necessary to our national life, and when this is accomplished, if there be leisure and means for adding the frills, let them be added.

Nine out of every ten high school students on emerging from that school enter the ranks of the toilers, in some department or other. If in their education the farm has not only been made attractive to them, but they have been given a thorough and practical knowledge of its workings, then a large percent of them will as a matter of course choose that as their occupation in life.

### ORDINANCE.

An Ordinance making it unlawful to disturb the peace and quiet of Sandy, providing a speed limit for vehicles, to prevent the obstruction of public ways and streets and to prevent the carrying of concealed weapons, or to resist an officer of Sandy in the performance of his duties and providing a penalty for the violation of this ordinance, and repealing Ordinance No. 10 of the City of Sandy.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COMMON COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF SANDY:

Section 1. It shall be unlawful for any person or persons to disturb the peace, quiet or good order of the City of Sandy by any violent, riotous or disorderly conduct or by the use of any profane, abusive, indecent or obscene language, on any street, highway or public place, and or within the corporate limits of the City of Sandy.

Section 2. That it shall be unlawful for any person or persons to drive or cause to be driven any vehicle, automobile, motor, motor cycle or steam car or machine, upon the streets, highways or public places of the City of Sandy at a greater speed than fifteen miles per hour.

Section 3. That it shall be unlawful for any person, persons or corporations to obstruct any street, ally, highway, sidewalk or public place within the corporate limits of the City of Sandy.

Section 4. That it shall be unlawful for any person to carry any concealed weapon, revolver, firearm, knife with blade more than five inches long, dirk, dagger, slug shot, metal knuckles or any other instrument by which injury could be inflicted upon the person of another, within the corporate limits of the City of Sandy.

Section 5. It shall be unlawful for any person or persons to abuse, attack resist any officer of the City of Sandy or to prevent such officer, while such peace officer, marshal or policeman is engaged in the discharge of his official duties of such officer.

Section 6. That any person, parties or corporations found guilty of violating any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and shall be punished by a fine of not less than five dollars or more than fifty dollars or by imprisonment not to exceed thirty days or by both fine and imprisonment.

Section 7. Ordinance No. Ten of the City of Sandy is hereby repealed. Passed 1st and 2nd readings March 5th, 1917.

### ORDINANCE.

An ordinance to amended an ordinance of the City of Sandy, Entitled, "An Ordinance governing the running at large of animals within the City of Sandy and regulating the impounding, sale and redemption of the same and providing a penalty for the violation of said ordinance and repealing ordinance No. 19, entitled, "An ordinance prohibiting the running at large of stock including horses, cattle, hogs, sheep, etc., within the corporate limits of the City of Sandy," by repealing Section VII and substitution therefore the following:

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COMMON COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF SANDY:

Section 1. Section VIII of an Ordinance entitled, "An Ordinance governing the running at large of animals within the City of Sandy and regulating the impounding, sale and redemption of the same and providing a penalty for the violation of said Ordinance and repealing Ordinance No. 19 entitled "An ordinance prohibiting the running at large of stock including horses, cattle, hogs, sheep, etc., within the corporate limits of the City of Sandy," be and the same is hereby repealed.

Section 2. That the following shall be known as Section VIII of the above entitled ordinance, and shall be a part thereof:

"Section VII. The fees for feeding animals shall not exceed one dollar per day for horses, fifty cents per day for mules and cattle, ten cents per day for other animals. That the poundmaster, the Marshall, Chief of Police of Sandy shall be entitled as a fee for impounding, registering and taking up and posting notices: for horses, mules or cattle fifty cents, for other animals twenty-five cents. That said officer shall further

### THE "OPEN DOOR."

What Is Meant by the Term In International Politics.

The "open door" is in international politics the principle of equal treatment in trade with oriental countries for all trading nations as opposed to the policy of effective monopoly in favor of any one nation.

The phrase came into popular use toward the end of the nineteenth century, when various European nations were trying to establish "spheres of influence" in China.

The United States was opposed to the granting to any nation of exclusive trading privileges in these "spheres of influence," and in 1899 John Hay, secretary of state, addressed a circular note to the interested powers, asking them to pledge themselves not to interfere with any treaty port or with any vested interest within their respective spheres of influence, to engage that discriminating customs and port duties should not be levied in such spheres and that within any nation's sphere of influence no higher railroad charges should be imposed upon subjects of other nations than upon subjects of the nations having such spheres.

The pledges asked were given in their entirety by France, Germany, Great Britain, Italy and Japan. Russia reserved the right to levy discriminatory duties.—New York Times.
